EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Genesis

Khudiram Bose Central College, 71/2A Bidhan Sarani, Kolkata 700006, was established in the year 1894 by Khudiram Bose. However during its inception the name of the college was Central Institution. Principal Khudiram Bose, as our founder is popularly known as, was a close associate of Pandit Iswar Chandra Vidyasagar and was also a teacher of Moral and Mental Philosophy at Metropolitan College (now known as Vidyasagar College). Central Institution was founded with the core vision to spread the cause of education among the middle class and to infuse into them the spirit of self reliance as the founder strongly believed that without self reliance there can never be freedom from any form of shackle. The early years of the college faced enough turbulence caused by the freedom struggle of the nation. Infact the college takes immense pride to say that one of the students of this college during its formative years was Jatindranath Mukherjee whom the nation remembers as *Bagha Jatin (7 December 1879 – 10 September 1915)*. Central Institution in its undaunting effort to serve the nation through the propagation of education confronted serious challenges in the wake of ongoing freedom struggles followed by partition of Bengal and resulting influx of refugees. As a consequence the college could not function from the period 1926 – 1956.

Revival

The college was revived in 1956 by Sri Kiran Coomar Bose, the elder son of Principal Khudiram Bose. In this herculean task Sri Kiran Coomar Bose was assisted by many distinguished persons of the time and Central Institution once again started its journey of service to humanity. This time the college was named Khudiram Bose Central College in honour of the founder, Principal Khudiram Bose.

The college started its second innings in 1956 and received affiliation under University of Calcutta in 1959. Khudiram Bose Central College got **2F and 12 B status from University Grants Commission in 1965**. It started as Night College offering undergraduate programme in general stream only in commerce. In 1967 the morning section flagged off with affiliation from Calcutta University to begin undergraduate courses in Humanities general stream. The morning section was only for girls and general stream subjects like Bengali, Hindi, English, Education, History, Political Science, Economics was offered from the academic session 1968-69. Parallel with undergraduate general courses the Higher Secondary (plus two course) also started. Economic geography was also taught at the H.S. level. From the academic session 1996-97 honours in Accountancy was introduced followed by honours in English, Bengali, History and Education from the session 2002-03 onwards. Honours in Political Science started from the academic session 2007-08. In 2007 the college was able to offer honours in Hindi. The college started offering Journalism and Mass Communication in the general stream from the session 2005-06 and honours in the subject was introduced from the academic year 2009-10. Honours in Geography started from the session 2010-11. Physical Education as a subject was offered in the general stream from the academic session 2009-10. At present the college has B.A., B.Com, and B.Sc. courses offering honours in Bengali, Hindi, English, Education, Political Science, History, Journalism and Mass Communication, Geography and Accountancy. The college also offers these subjects in general stream along with Economics and Physical Education.

NAAC - Recommendations and Implementation

In 2007, 23rd and 24th March, the college conducted NAAC and was accredited with C+ grade. After NAAC visit the following recommendations were suggested

- ✓ Partition of the large classrooms to create more classrooms
- ✓ Introducing new honours and general subjects in the College
- ✓ Offering Spoken English courses and Computer training to the students
- ✓ Opening Science stream in the College

- ✓ Filling up vacant teaching posts
- ✓ Evaluation of teaching methods
- ✓ Generating more resources
- ✓ Minor research project
- ✓ Developing the Alumni Association
- ✓ Teachers to publish papers
- ✓ Placement, Career guidance and Counseling cells could be started
- ✓ Teachers should be encouraged to participate in seminars
- ✓ College should organize more cultural programmes
- ✓ Conducting parents – teachers meeting at regular intervals
- ✓ Higher percentage of budget to be allocated for academic facilities

The college has been successful in incorporating most of the suggestions offered by the NAAC Peer Team. From the academic session of 2007-08 night and day sifts have been merged and the college functions as Day College. The problem concerning shortage of space still creates difficulties but in keeping with NAAC recommendation some of the bigger class rooms have been partitioned to generate smaller class rooms.

The college is totally dependent on West Bengal College Service Commission for appointment of full time teaching staff. The College has applied to the Education Directorate for creation posts in different subjects. The college also was able to appoint six teachers in 2010 with recommendation from West Bengal College Service Commission. The teachers were appointed in Journalism and Mass Communication, Education, Political Science, Geography, Bengali and History. To meet the shortage of teachers the college appoints guest teachers in various subjects so that students do not suffer. The financial liability is met from the college's own coffer.

Every year the college organizes parents – teachers meet. This meet serves as a platform for the parents, Principal and the teachers where a healthy exchange of ideas takes place. Parents are given full details of their ward's performance by the different departmental teachers.

Under the aegis of UGC 11th Plan Merged Scheme, the college started a host of programmes like

- a) **Remedial coaching Class** – the weak students belonging to the SC /ST /OBC category can avail extra classes under this scheme. These remedial classes give the students an opportunity to improve their area of study.
- b) **Entry Into services** – the students of this college as well as outside candidates studying for different competitive exams can enroll themselves in different courses offered under this banner.
- c) **Career Counseling Cell** – this unit organizes workshops and seminars with various companies who offer job oriented courses. In the year 2011 this cell arranged a Career Fair where institutes such as NIIT, ICFAI, MNINT, TRIPLE C and many more participated. This facilitated the students of this college as well as the students of neighboring colleges. Apart from the students, the staff of our college also got enriched.

The college formed the Placement Cell to facilitate the students by arranging interviews for college students. Various companies hold campus interviews. In the recent past companies like Firstsource, 2COMs Consulting Pvt. Ltd., Zed Career Academy, Wipro conducted campus interviews in the college.

The teachers of the college publish papers in journals, edit books and publish books. They act as resource persons and present papers in seminars and workshops. One of our teachers, Prof. Shilpa Nandy of Political Science department has completed her Minor Research project with fund from UGC. She received Rs. 98000.00 from UGC for this purpose. Her paper was titled '*Socio Economic and Political Status of Fisherwomen Community: A Study of purba Midnapore and South 24 Parganas.*' Two other teachers, Prof Sheuli Biswas (Adhikary) and Prof. Raja Ghosh have submitted proposals for Minor Research Project to UGC.

The college has formed its own Cultural Committee so that different cultural programmes can be arranged both internally and externally. The students of our college participate in different programmes organized by other colleges.

The IQAC of the college conducts an extensive evaluation of the college. This evaluation is done by the students of third year class. The SWOC report is placed in the meeting of the Governing Body. The college is able to get a holistic idea as this report covers areas like teaching, infrastructure, office, library, administration, extension activities. If there is any lacuna in our service to the students, as evidenced from the report, the Principal of the college ensures that proper redressal is made at the earliest.

The journey continues...

The college has accepted with total humility and integrity the various suggestions put forward by NAAC team. While we have been able to attain success in certain spheres there are still many more hurdles which we are yet to overcome. The college as one team faces each challenge as a learning experience and endeavours to serve humanity as envisaged by our founder Principal Khudiram Bose. In our effort to inculcate in our students the quality of self reliance the college has adopted this virtue as its motto. As students are our nation builders the college tries to play an effective role in making the students responsible global citizens. Two wings – the NSS and NCC inject into the students the spirit of serving the nation. Students are asked to enroll in either or both of these cells and there are college teachers who are in charge of these cells.

Education is not just books and exams. We strongly believe a student's physical health is instrumental in developing his mental health. The college strongly promotes Sports as a core area and in this effect separate rule is made during the time of admission. Any student who may be a promising sportsman is entitled to relaxation of college marks criteria during his/her admission. The admission committee scrutinizes such applications and grants permission to befitting candidates. Students participate not only in various Calcutta University sports events but also programmes organized by other organizations. Many of our students have participated in various sports events at the National level and have secured commendable positions. Our college hosted the Inter College Government Sports, North Kolkata held for non – Government Colleges of North Kolkata in the years 2010 and 2011. The college holds Annual Sports Meet where not only students but also the members of the staff participate.

The college strongly believes that there must be a platform where a student can express his/her opinions without inhibitions. The college magazine called *The Light* offers this scope to the students. Apart from college magazine each department has its own wall magazine which gets published annually. The English department has its printed publication called '*Chokher Aloe – Vision beyond*'. Some of the Wall Magazines are -

- **Uttaran – History department**
- **Educatum – Education department**
- **Diganta – Journalism and Mass Communication department**

Various departments conduct departmental seminars to inculcate among the students the value of research.

Since 2014 different departments conduct study tours for its students. These tours at times are directly related to the students's academic area but at times these tours digress from the students's core academic area and focus on something entirely new. This not only satisfies the academic curiosity of the students but also serves to widen their horizon.

The college acknowledges the effort put by students in attaining success at their University exams. From 2012 onwards according to the decision of the Governing Body of the College prizes to students of the college are given on the basis of performance in Calcutta University exams as also on the basis of extra curricular activities if one wins laurels in university / Inter – college State level competitions. Prizes are awarded on the basis of results of Part III, Part II and Part I exam to Honours students securing highest marks in all the above examinations, provided the candidate has scored a minimum of 50% marks and cleared all the subjects. Similarly in the General category prizes are awarded to candidates securing highest marks in Part III, Part II and Part I provided that the candidate (s) has scored a minimum of 50%. Any candidate securing First Class in Honours is awarded Gold medal. Any candidate securing First Division is awarded a special prize. The College Topper among honours students will be awarded Khudiram Bose Memorial Prize (Gold Medal). The President of the Governing Body, Sri Asok Chaudhuri, funds the prize awarded to the "girl student securing highest marks" in Honours, among all subjects. Teachers of different departments (Dr. Shubhra Upadhyaya – Hindi department, Prof. Shilpa Nandy – olitical Science department and Dr. Sriparna Dutta – English department) award prizes to students of their respective departments in memory of their parents. The principal of our college, Dr Subir Kumar Dutta gives an award to the topper in commerce stream.

One of our major challenges remains the final output in terms of number of graduates. Though the number is on the rise still it has not yet attained satisfactory position. However the department of Journalism and Mass Communication has earned laurels at Calcutta University exam. Payel Bose of this department secured 4th position in the total ranking of Part III exam of Calcutta University in 2013 and in the same year Bratati Chakraborty of JMC was in 2nd position in Part II Calcutta University exam.

The college publishes its annual newsletter covering all the activities undertaken in the calendar year. After the revival of the college in 1956 a teachers' journal was also published. However due to certain problems this publication was discontinued. Through the untiring effort of *Prof Shilpa Nandy the journal has once again surfaced daylight and very soon will be published under the title Pragma with its own ISSN 2454 5279.*

Each year the college conducts two annual lectures – one organized by department of Hindi titled 'Munshi Premchand Smriti Vyakhyanmala' to celebrate Munshi Premchand Jayanti and the other titled '*Khudiram Bose Memorial Lecture*' held on 15th December in honour of our founder Principal Khudiram Bose. Apart from these two annual lectures National Youth Day is celebrated every year on 12th January with a lot of fanfare. Bengali department celebrates Bhasa Divas on 21st February and Rabindra Jayanti on 9th May. Independence Day and Republic Day are also observed by the college.

It is really a matter of immense pride to state that our college is perhaps the only college in North Kolkata that has a Women Cell. This Cell inaugurated on 13th March 2015 was set up with a vision to serve the girl student and also the female staff of the college. The Cell promulgated its fundamental area of functioning in its inaugural ceremony and has since then played active role in spreading awareness related to women rights.

It will also not be out of context to mention that the college has been able to ensure that the girl student of the college get financial support given to girl students under *Kanyashree Prakalpa* funded by Government of West Bengal. *Prof. Anamika Nandy* of the History department is entrusted with the effective deployment of this scholarship. She takes keen interest and attends all meetings conducted by the Government in this regard. Her meticulous thoroughness in performing the responsibility has resulted in almost hundred percent success in obtaining financial aid for the students.

It would not be out of context to give a picture of the staff composition of this college. At present out of twelve full time teachers there are seven female teachers. Around forty percent of our students are female. Even our Governing Body has to its credit a lady member.

It is a matter of immense satisfaction to state that our college believes in developing healthy relation between authority, teachers, non – teaching members and students. In fact this careful nurturing of relationship among the various components of the college serves as our USP. Students of our college thrive on this healthy co-ordination. They are able to share with their teachers not only their academic problems but also their personal problems. Therefore it will not be incorrect to say that teachers also play the role of counselors. The students of our college have total freedom to meet the Principal whenever they need his advice.

The college has an elected Students' Union. This body comprises representatives of each year of B.A., B.SC., B.COM. One of the teachers acts as President of Students' Union. This body serves as an effective medium in the development of the college. Their valued inputs in different aspects of college functioning is instrumental in the smooth sailing of the college. The General Secretary of the Students' Union is a member of the Governing Body of the college. Events like Annual Picnic, Freshers' Welcome, Annual Social, Saraswati Puja, Independence Day observation, Republic Day observation are arranged by the Students' Union of our College.

"A life spent making mistakes is not only more honourable, but more useful than a life spent doing nothing", said George Bernard Shaw. We in our college indulge our students to make mistakes as we believe there is no better teacher than the self. This is totally in line with our vision of self reliance. In order to be self reliant one has to learn to be courageous, responsible, open to criticism and have the ability to be a good team member. At Khudiram Bose Central College students are not just taught what the syllabus specifies but they are taught how to explore. This is not easy for them and neither is it easy for us teachers to channelize the students into such a thought pattern. But the KBCC (Khudiram Bose Central College) faculty is more than determined to give their students a little extra that will help them to become better individuals.

The teaching faculty of this college is constantly trying to think of new techniques to make the syllabus more interesting for the students. Apart from the time tested chalk and board method and the system of class lecture, the teachers believe in being innovative. Inter departmental classes are arranged, departmental seminars are held, students are asked to prepare papers on different issues.

It is very often believed that the *alumni* happen to be the strongest pillar of any educational institution. Khudiram Bose Central College has a legacy of 121 years and is the alma Mata of many illuminating star alumnae under its umbrella like freedom fighter and martyr Bagha Jatin, advocate Dwarikanath Bandyopadhyay, Renowned Teacher of English at Presidency University Tarakanath Sen and many more. It was on 9th April 2012, that the college first took the initiative and formed an internal alumni association named ---*Punarnava* and organized its first re-union programme under the leadership of Prof. Shilpa Nandy. Moreover, the Alumni Committee of the college decided to get this body registered under Societies Registration Act, 1961. With this aim, the college has already completed its registration process and is soon expecting to get its registration number.

It has already been stated that Prof Shilpa Nandy has successfully completed her Minor Research Project in 2014. She is in the process of getting a Major Research Project to be funded by ICSSR.

The college is still in the process of developing its infrastructure. Separate laboratories have been created for Geography, Commerce and Journalism departments. Efforts are being made to technically upgrade the language and social science departments. Whenever funds are available the college tries to provide laptops to these departments so that they can prepare study materials for their departments as well as maintain records of their respective departments. Though some of the departments under the schools of language and social science are yet to get technological facility there is a practice of sharing prevalent among the different departments which the departments arrange between themselves. Departments have been provided with their

own storage facility so that they can, if they want to, set up departmental libraries. The college library has grown over the years and books are easily available to the students. Infrastructure guarantees security of the students. CCTV cameras are placed at strategic locations so that major areas of the college get covered. The college has its own fire safety equipment. Water purifiers ensure that students get clean drinking water.

The college library has grown over the years. Since our first NAAC visit in 2007 the college has now over 21,000 books and journal subscription. The library also keeps newspapers like The Times Of India, Ananda Bazar Patrika and the weekly Employment News. The college library also keeps The Accountant Management, EPW, Open, and Competition Success. The newspapers are at first kept in the ground floor on the newspaper stand for the benefit of the students. After the appointment of our new librarian in November 2014 the college is very optimistic that the library will grow both in terms of technology and book acquisition.

The college runs M.A., M.Sc., M.Com programmes under the Directorate of Distance Education, Vidyasagar University. This facilitates those students who are not able to join regular postgraduate courses at different Universities. M.A. subjects offered are Bengali, English, Sanskrit, Political Science, History. M.Sc. in Geography is offered.

The college is also taking measures to generate funds for its development. The college space is rented on Sundays to different agencies to conduct their examinations. For example the college space was used to host exams like Staff Selection (Government of West Bengal), Banking exams, Railway recruitment Council, Eastern Railways, School Service Commission exam, NET and so on. Many private sector institutes like ICFAI also conducted their exams in our college on Sundays. Many of our staff remains present on Sundays so that these exams can be arranged. Though the staff gets paid for their extra work it still needs to be mentioned that the small amount paid to them as TA is nothing compared to the labour they provide so that the college stands to benefit

Future initiatives...

The college is still in its transition phase. While it is trying to hold on to its rich cultural past at the same time the college is trying to ameliorate the philanthropic vision of its founder. Our future projects are detailed in Post Accreditation Initiatives of the SSR.

The rest of the Self Study Report will accommodate issues like student strength, evaluation, research, various activities and best practices. In order to avoid repetition details pertaining to these aspects have been avoided in the summary. It just remains to be said that Khudiram Bose Central College believes in striving for academic excellence without forgetting to enthuse into the students values of sportsmanship, integrity and service to humanity. The environment of the college is conducive to holistic development of the students.

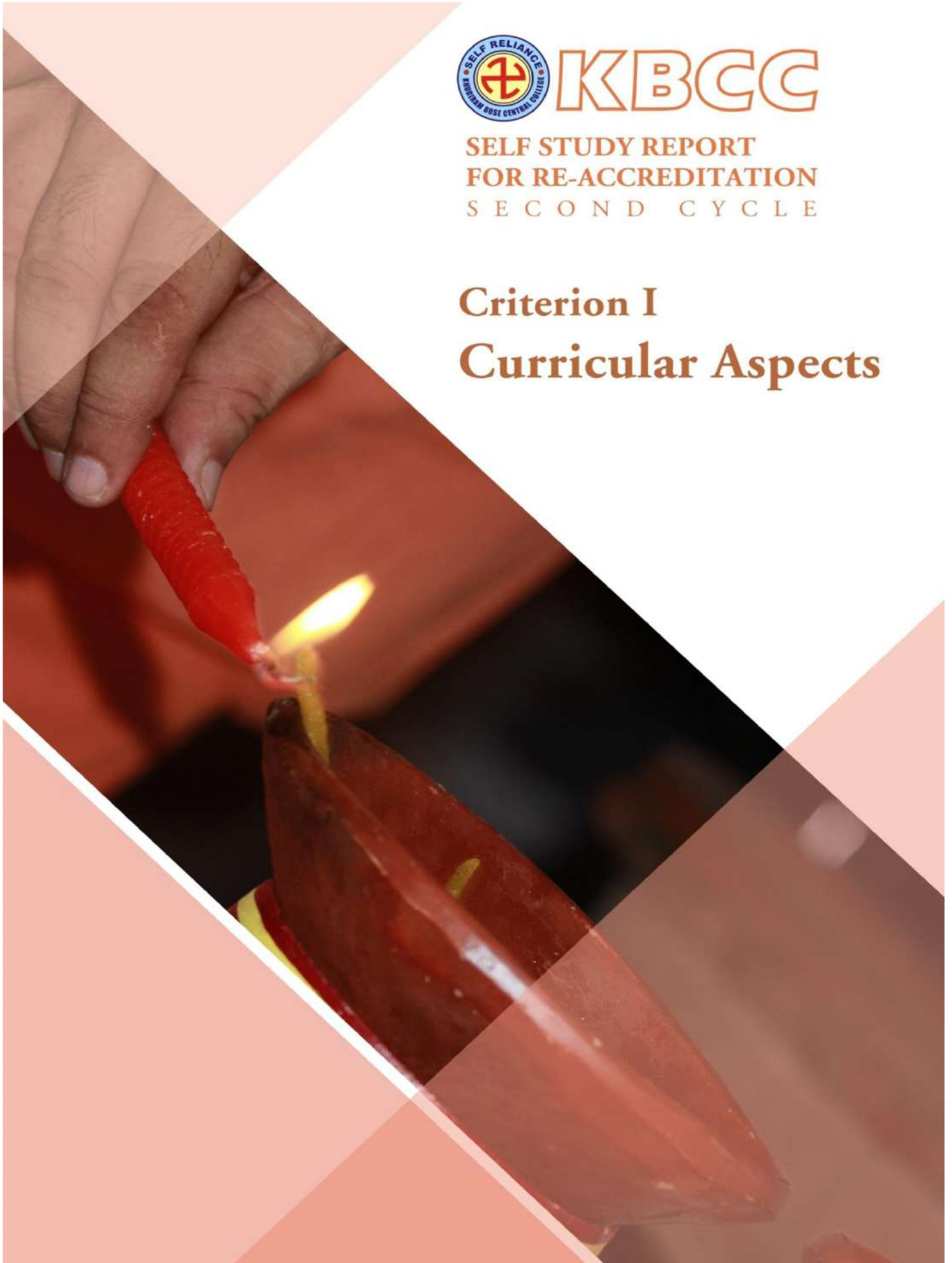

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Our founding father Principal Khudiram Bose started this college in 1894 with the objective of “self reliance.” Though the college could not function from 1926 to 1955 due to the ongoing freedom struggles this objective never got lost. **Even after the revival of the college in 1956 by Sri Kiran Coomar Bose “self reliance” became the vision statement of the college. In fact the college logo reflects this motto of self reliance.**

At present the college runs both honours and general streams in arts, science and commerce. Since its second phase, the college has been very particular in achieving the vision envisaged by our founding father. In fact our mission is directed towards fulfillment of this vision. The college aspires to attain self reliance in two fields –

- making the college self reliant
- making the students self reliant

Making the college self reliant:

The college tries to attain self reliance for itself by obtaining financial independence to ensure development, academic flexibility for quality education and also taking necessary steps to inculcate among the teachers, non teaching staff and students the skills of leadership and team spirit.

Making the students self reliant:

Students can be made self reliant in three aspects – financial, social and moral. Good education and proper career guidance can help students to become financially stable in their lives. All the teachers make intense effort to see that their students get good education at undergraduate level so that they can pursue their next level of career option. Not only is education streamlined as per Calcutta University syllabi the Placement and Career Cells of the college conduct interviews for the students with various companies. The NCC and NSS wings of the college imbibe in the students value of social responsibility.

Objectives:

Information related to the vision, mission and objectives of the college are disseminated to all the members of the college, students and stakeholders in many ways.

- The college prospectus clearly states the objectives and also the core areas where the focus is on. The prospectus contains details of all information necessary to know the college – facilities, evaluation, fee structure, rules and regulations.
- Every year just before the beginning of academic session the colleges arranges an inauguration ceremony for the freshers. An eminent person is invited to give a talk on any current relevant issue. In this ceremony the principal in his inaugural speech summarizes the core objectives of the college and also highlights the USP of the college.

- *Annual Parents – teachers’ Meet is arranged every year by the college. Parents interact directly with the Principal of the college and come to know about the commitments made by the college to forward the cause of education. They also meet the respective departmental teachers to know about their ward’s performance.*
- The college has an alumni body. This body is in the process of being registered under *West Bengal Societies Act, 1961.*

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college follows the syllabus framed by University of Calcutta and cannot initiate any change in the syllabus. Teachers of our college participate in workshops on syllabus conducted by Calcutta University. Though the college has no autonomy in introducing any changes in the syllabus we enjoy the academic freedom in implementation of syllabus.

Teachers prepare academic calendar every year for the students. This academic calendar contains all necessary details catering to contents of syllabus, time frame of syllabus coverage, evaluation routine and other information that a department may consider worthwhile to be mentioned in academic calendar.

The departments just don’t follow the time tested chalk and board method of teaching. **Innovative techniques like using technology aided teaching are encouraged by college authority.** Several departments have their own departmental laptops so that they can formulate their own lesson plans.

Each department maintains ‘departmental record book’ where teachers maintain daily record of topic/s discussed in class. Principal checks these record books to see whether coverage of syllabus takes place as per schedule stated in academic calendar.

To make studies more interesting the departments take their students on ‘education tours.’ Political Science, Journalism and Mass Communication departments took the students of their departments to Vidhan Sabha. History department visited Indian Museum. These education tours are not only directly related to a student’s area of study. At times these tours digress and look beyond the scope of syllabus. The English department took the students to Birla Museum of Technology where the students had a fun filled day of watching various science shows.

Departments also have their own departmental wall magazines. These magazines teach students how to do research work on a particular topic. The English department has its own printed magazine and students enrich this magazine with poems, stories, paintings. All these contribute to the development of a student.

Apart from exams specified by Calcutta University the college conducts unit tests and class assignments. Teachers are very meticulous about these tests and assignments are returned with due comments. Marks obtained by students in unit tests are shown to parents in Parents – teachers’ Meet.

Many departments organize departmental seminars where students prepare and present papers on particular topics. In the recent past history department and English department organized such seminars. The English department shows the movie version of texts to the students. Every year two days are devoted to film show. Hindi department introduced a new system of teaching – dramatization of a piece from their syllabus.

Workshops are arranged for students on particular areas of their syllabus. The Journalism and Mass Communication department conducted such workshops where resource persons had come from Hindustan Times and Times of India.

Another mechanism followed by the college to implement the curriculum of Calcutta University is the attendance of the students. As per Calcutta University norms each student has to maintain 75% attendance to be eligible to sit for CU exam. All the departments meticulously follow this and at regular intervals publish attendance list of the students. Students who lag behind are closely monitored and at times departmental teachers also inform the guardians of such students. Even when after repeated reminders students do not take initiative to attend classes their names get struck off from the college register.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Khudiram Bose Central College is affiliated to Calcutta University. **Teachers from time to time attend Orientation programmes and Refresher Courses conducted by Calcutta University and other universities.** However, teachers not only participate in OP and RC conducted by the Academic Staff College of Calcutta University they also at times join OP and RC conducted by other Universities of the country. Teachers also attend seminars and workshops. All these help in the academic development of teachers.

Apart from this academic orientation the teachers also get infrastructural support from the college. For the past few years the college is making an effort to improve type of teaching imparted to the students. As some of our teachers are quite tech savvy the college provides the basic infrastructure they require. Most of our departments have been provided with laptops and teachers of these departments use them for purpose of teaching. All departments have their own departmental almirahs so that whenever they want they can start their own departmental libraries.

The college has an LCD Projector and departments like Journalism, Geography and English use it in classroom.

The college is now thinking of ear marking a room as AV room so that the departments will have the liberty of effectively using it.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other Statutory agency.

The undergraduate syllabus followed by the college is as specified Calcutta University. The college cannot in any way change any aspect of the syllabi. However teachers participate in 'curriculum design' workshop organized by Calcutta University.

Though the college is totally guided by CU as far as syllabus is concerned the college is quite innovative in effective translation of this syllabus to the students. Continuous efforts are taken by teachers to present the course to the students in an interesting way.

For this the departments –

- ◆ Arrange cinematic rendition of texts.
- ◆ Arrange film shows
- ◆ Arrange dramatization of texts
- ◆ Arrange workshops
- ◆ Departmental seminars
- ◆ Educational tours
- ◆ Extension lectures

Academic calendar is prepared by all the departments at the beginning of each academic year. This calendar gives the students a general idea about their three years of undergraduate learning.

Each department takes extra care to ensure that the college library has sufficient books to cater to the needs of the departmental students. In our college the honours students can issue up to five books at a time and a student in the general stream can issue up to three books at a time. This is very beneficial for the students as many of our students come from very humble background and cannot afford to purchase books. Books are also purchased whenever there is any change in Calcutta University syllabus.

The departments also arrange inter departmental classes so that students get ideas on related areas of their subject from respective teachers. *For example, the English department arranged classes with teachers of history and political science departments to give the students lectures on French Revolution and political thoughts of Locke and Rousseau.*

To ensure how far students have been able to grasp their syllabus the college conducts 'unit tests'. These unit tests are taken above and beyond the scheduled exams specified by Calcutta University. Students are also given assignments to monitor their development.

Tutorial classes are arranged to cater to specific academic need of a student. Arrangements are also made for special classes and such classes are taken by teachers above their regular schedule.

The Academic Committee reviews results of students. Suggestions come from this Committee as to where and how we can improve our academic standards.

Under UGC Merged Scheme XII Plan the college received financial grant to conduct Remedial Classes for SC/ST and other minority groups. This grant specially benefitted the students as many more extra classes were arranged. The departments tried to engage faculty from other college to take these classes.



Remedial Coaching Classes

Feedback from different quarters also contributes to the evaluation of learning teaching processes practiced in the college. Feedbacks are collected from –

- ◆ Students (outgoing students are asked to do an evaluation of all aspects of the college and teaching learning is part of this evaluation)
- ◆ Principal visits departments and collects feedback from the students concerning teaching – learning
- ◆ Departmental meetings followed by Academic Committee meetings serve as effective tools to monitor teaching learning.

The college, apart from undergraduate courses also offers post graduate courses under Directorate of Distance Education, Vidyasagar University (DDEVU). Students who cannot enroll themselves as regular students get a chance to pursue postgraduate studies under DDEVU. Programmes offered in postgraduate courses are

- ◆ M.A. in Bengali, Hindi, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science
- ◆ M.Sc. in Geography
- ◆ M.Com.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The Career and Counseling Cell of the college organized ‘Career Fair’ where different companies like NIIT, Triple C, ICWAI, Academics, Edge, IMS, MNIMT, ICFAI put up their stalls in the college campus and interacted with the students regarding job options and job

market. Many companies also gave seminar shows and conducted workshops for the benefit of the students. The Placement Cell of the college arranges interviews with different companies for the third year students.

The third year students of Commerce have to do a 'project' paper of 100marks. For this the students at times interact with people belonging to industry. The students of the department of Journalism and Mass Communication also have to do a 'documentary' in their third year of undergraduate study. These documentaries cover various subjects and the students directly meet people belonging to different industries and takes interviews.

Interaction with the University takes place at two levels – academic and administrative. As far as academics is concerned the teachers meet the University faculties for purposes of seminars, workshops and also during OP and RC.

Administrative interaction is mainly done by the office staff regarding examination, introducing new subjects in college, students' registration and host of other issues.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

Our teachers take part in 'workshops on syllabus' organized by Calcutta University.

The college collects feedback from the stakeholders regarding teaching learning practiced in the college.

Every year students do an evaluation of the total college, including teaching learning, facilities, infrastructure, teaching staff, non teaching staff and college administration. This SWOC analysis helps the college in identifying the gaps that get bridged from time to time.

The college holds annual Parents – teachers' Meet and in these meets interaction takes place between teachers and parents and principal and parents. Feedbacks from parents prove instrumental in development of the college.

The college is in the process of registering its 'alumni body' under West Bengal societies Registration Act 1961. Once this gets completed our alumni will become much more organized and their cumulative experience will open new avenues of development.

The college at present does not have any such course.

The college has its own monitoring system. The unit tests and class assignments help the teachers to gauge their students' level of understanding.

Moreover the different feedback mechanisms also help to monitor effective implementation of curriculum

The college offers the following courses to develop the skills of the students –

- ✦ Spoken English classes for the students of the college were arranged by the English department. These classes were held after general class hours. The English department is going to revive these classes again from next session onwards i.e. 2016-17.
- ✦ The college received grant from UGC to conduct Entry Into Services training for SC/ST and weaker sections of the society. The college has an Entry Into service Cell that caters to the requirements of this programme. This Cell conducted a six months certificate course on 'Combined Services', pertaining to rail, bank PSC and SSC.

These subjects are also offered as subjects in general stream along with Economics and Physical Education.

The subject combinations given above also change depending on the need of the students. The college for the last three years has been promoting sports. Students who want to pursue sports take up Physical Education as their general subject. *This year Physical Education was part of Groups F,G,H,and I.* However during admission students were reluctant to take English and Economics as their combination subject with Physical Education. The Admission Committee on students' demand changed the subject combination of these groups and revised them as follows

Candidates, Honours and General, in all three streams Arts, Science, Commerce have to take up Compulsory English of 50 marks and MIL (Bengali or Hindi) of 50 marks in the First Year and ENVS of 100 marks in the Third Year.

◆ Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options – NA

◆ Courses offered in modular form

Calcutta University offers some of its subjects in modular form –

- Journalism and Mass Communication
- Education
- Geography
- Commerce

◆ Credit transfer and accumulation facility – NA

◆ Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses

Vertical mobility is offered by Calcutta University in the Commerce stream of undergraduate studies. The first year of the syllabus of Commerce is not bifurcated into honours and general courses. All the students have to take up the same subjects. It is only in their second year that the commerce students have specific honours and general subjects.

◆ Enrichment courses

The college offers multiple enrichment courses –

- Spoken English course conducted by the English Department of the college. This course will again be resumed from the academic year 2016-17.
- Remedial Coaching for the SC / ST and other minority groups.
- Career Counseling Cell organizes programmes with different companies
- Entry into Services Cell organizes job related courses to facilitate the students of not only our college but students of other colleges also.

The Entry into Services Cell also aims at chiseling the knowledge bank of the students and channelizing it to suit the requirements of the global scenario.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Calcutta University provides a broad spectrum of curriculum to be followed by the colleges affiliated to it. The University highlights the subjects to be offered under arts, science and commerce categories. The University also provides details of the different subject combinations. All the colleges enjoy the flexibility of formulating their own method of curriculum dissemination.

Our college offers a wide range of subjects in the humanities group from which students can determine their undergraduate course of study. Though the college only offers geography in the science group there are plans to introduce new subjects in this category to give the students more choice of subjects.

The college arranges

- Tutorial classes, remedial classes, education tours, film shows of prescribed texts and others related to texts, departmental seminars, extension lectures, workshops, dramatization of part of texts, quiz, debates and other enrichment programmes as add ons to the University curriculum

- Apart from focusing on academics the college also ensures holistic development of a student and takes measures to see that his /her physical, mental, social and psychological progressions are in tune with his / her academic progress. The NCC / NSS wings of the college and multiple Committees and Cells work in this effect.

- Sports is key part of our college curriculum. Students participate in University sports, Government sponsored sports for non – government colleges and other sports events organized by agencies like Kolkata Police. Annual College Sports Day is a big event and students, teachers and non – teaching staff participate in this.

- Apart from University specified exams the college also has system of conducting unit tests and class assignments. These enable teachers to understand students' level of understanding the syllabus.
- The Prize distribution ceremony was started with the purpose of motivating the students to perform better at Calcutta University exams.

The various levels of feedback mechanisms practiced in the college also supplements University's curriculum.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college has an active Career Counseling Cell formed with grant received from UGC under XI Plan Merged Scheme. This Cell functions with the primary objective of mentoring the students to get prepared for the job market. The Career Counseling Cell arranged Career Fair and multiple institutes and companies like NIIT, ICFAI, Academics, Edge, MNIMT, Triple C, ICWAI and many others took part. Students interacted with these people and got guidance on career options. It is worthwhile to say that not only students of our college benefitted but students from other colleges also participated and got information related to career options.

Companies like Shree Automotive Pvt. Ltd, Wipro, ZED CA, Techmatrix and Merit Track also conducted seminars and workshops in our college.

The Placement Cell organizes job interviews for students with various companies. In the recent past companies like Techmatrix and Merit Track.

The Entry into Services Cell was also formed with grant received from UGC under XI Plan Merged Scheme. Students of this college as well as outside candidates avail free coaching classes for competitive exams.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Environmental education is now part of Calcutta University third year undergraduate syllabus. All the third year students have to do 75 marks of theory and 25 marks project work. Environment has been made a mandatory component of Calcutta University syllabus so that students get aware of the global environmental condition and the imperative threat our environment face from our miscalculated actions.

The college has taken certain steps in order to ensure clean environment within the college campus. The college has been made 'no smoking zone' and spitting of pan masala has been made a punishable offence. Littering is also not permitted and waste baskets have been placed at strategic locations. Our college at present cannot boast of a garden but a small area in front of the college has some trees. An open space beside the teachers' room will be used as a garden. However as construction work is going on inside the college this plan is now in abeyance.

One of the suggestions of the IQAC was formation of Women Cell in the college. On 13th March 2015 the college formed its own Women Cell and perhaps is the only college in North Kolkata that has this Cell. Apart from sensitizing students about gender equality and zero tolerance as far as any form of abuse is concerned this Cell also handled complains from students. The objectives behind the genesis of such a Cell were publicized through pamphlets distributed to students in both the inauguration ceremony and during admission. The famous social activist Miratun Nahar inaugurated this Cell and the Late Dr. Rajashri Basu, Director of Women Studies Centre, Rabindra Bharati University was present in the inauguration ceremony.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The various mechanisms of feedback from the stakeholders followed by the college are as follows-

- Evaluation of the College by the Students – for the last three years the IQAC of the college conducts this evaluation. The format of the evaluation covers all aspects of the college like teaching – learning, support from teachers and non teaching staff of the college, infrastructure, facilities offered by the college, administration, extracurricular activities, Students’ Union, vertical expansion. This SWOC analysis done by the students help us to identify the areas where we still need to develop.

- Feedback from parents – the college arranges annual parents – teachers’ meet every year. The guardians / parents get an opportunity to directly interact with Principal and teachers. Parents come out with suggestions and these prove invaluable as these suggestions help us to serve the students better.
- Feedback given by students to Principal – The Principal of the college makes it a point to visit the departments and he collects feedbacks from the students about completion of syllabus, tests and any other issue that students want to be redressed. These points are taken up in departmental meetings and changes are initiated wherever necessary.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

Monitoring the enrichment programmes form part of evaluation processes maintained by the college. Moreover the enrichment programmes have their own coordinators who accurately follow the progress of such programmes.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The college follows the curriculum framed by Calcutta University and does not have the liberty to change any part of the curriculum. However teachers do participate in workshops on curriculum organized by the University.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If ‘yes’, how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The various mechanisms to obtain feedback from the students have already been enumerated. Till now an analysis of the feedback has not been communicated to the University.

The feedback obtained is discussed at various levels – department, Academic Committee and Governing Body of the college. Changes as and when required are incorporated to cater to the diversifying needs of the students. These changes implemented within the internal framework of curriculum dissemination serve in the enhancement of quality education.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

In the last four years the college introduced a host of programmes with financial grant from UGC under XI Plan Merged Scheme

- ✦ **Remedial Coaching Class** – the weak students belonging to the SC /ST /minority category can avail extra classes under this scheme. These remedial classes give the students an opportunity to improve their area of study.
- ✦ **Entry Into services** – the students of this college as well as outside candidates studying for different competitive exams can enroll themselves in different courses offered under this banner. This gives them an opportunity to get training for six months for different competitive exams free of cost and they are provided with a certificate after the completion of the course.
- ✦ **Career Counseling Cell** – this unit organizes workshops and seminars with various companies who offer job oriented courses. In the year 2011 this cell arranged a Career Fair where institutes such as NIIT, ICFAI, MNINT, TRIPLE C and many more participated.

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include

The college would like to highlight some aspects of curriculum development which it already has and would like to introduce in the near future –

- ◆ The college runs postgraduate courses under the Directorate of Distance Education, Vidyasagar University. M.A., M.Sc., and M.Com. in English, Bengali, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Geography and Commerce are offered respectively.
- ◆ The college plans to introduce new subjects at the undergraduate level like computer science, psychology and sociology. The rationale behind the thought of introducing these subjects is absolutely need based. Every year during admission many students enquire whether the college has these subjects. Observing the demand for these subjects there are plans to ask Calcutta University permission to offer these subjects as general course subjects once we are able to create space within the college campus.
- ◆ Some of our departments are already thinking of opening postgraduate courses in their departments. The departments of Journalism and Mass Communication and Geography have already initiated the process.

2.1.2 How does the college ensure publicity and Transparency in the admission process?

The Khudiram Bose Central College website offers information, important dates and notification regarding the admission process and the admission process in our college fully a manual process till the year 2014 like form fills up, submission, merit list publication in the college notice board and admission of the candidates. From the year 2015 we are following an online process as per the University guide lines and government order.

This year the admission process was categorized in different phases like:

• Publicity:

- i) College website offers details about the different segments of college and especially the admission column link is further sub linked with departments, courses, admission procedure.
- ii) college banners and hoardings containing courses offered and contact information and website details are being hanged and put up not only in front of college but also in different commuters spots like railway stations, ferry ghats , schools and other places of importance in the cities and suburb
- iii) Scrollings in Regional TV Channels like Newstime and 24 Ghanta etc.
- iv) Advertisement in most circulated newspaper of the region like Anandabazar Patrika
- v) Distribution of pamphlets by the local newspaper distributor in different localities of the city.

• Admission Meetings with all the members of the college:

Every year after the Higher Secondary Result pre and post publication, Principal summons a meeting with all the staffs of the college including Students General Secretary as an invitee and detail admission procedure is being discussed with them. This meeting also decides the convenor of the admission process and a committee is being formed. Finally that committee along with all the staffs starts the admission process and gives the guideline to all.

• Upgradation of the college website, specially regarding the admission section:

To keep the process transparent the college was assisted with a renowned software Agency, SB Creation and Brand Value Communication. They developed new software related to admission purpose of the college.

• Online Admission Procedure:

The college website contains detail information about the admission and guidelines framed by the college affiliated to its university. The admission committee of 2015 made a unique attempt by inserting a power point presentation of the entire admission process which however have helped the students immensely. To point few like courses offered, cut off marks subject wise, seats details, important notification and announcements of dates of form fill up, submission, publication of merit list. All these were made completely online. Besides, the college also ensured

the publication of merit list, criteria of marks, seat details, important dates etc related to admission in college notice board. Also the completed soft copy of the prospectus was also being uploaded. The college made its online financial transaction related to admission process with State Bank of India, Beadon Street Branch.

• **Post online procedure formalities at college office:**

Once a student completes all the online transaction and deposits the fees is finally enrolled as student of the college. The student is then provided the hard copies of prospectus along with brochure of women cell, Newsletter of the college and pamphlet regarding Free coaching classes guidelines provided by the Entry into Services cell of the college and is asked to come on a particular day on which the principal welcomes the students and discuss the rules and regulations of the college. The inaugural lecture has been a convention of this college will be delivered by a Maharajji of Ramkrishna Mission Institute.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

Admission to the First Year Degree course follows university norms. The students applying for first year degree courses need to complete the admission procedure as prescribed by the college (The details mentioned in 2.1.1).

❖ The admission process in our college is fully based on merit and rank of the students. In our college we have the prior set criterion in case of some subjects like Geography, English, Journalism and Mass Communication and Commerce where the Departmental Heads are given the opportunity to set their subject criterion based upon the demands and requirements. Some other subjects are there like History, Education Political Science Bengali Hindi etc. where the criterions are set strictly based upon the University norms.

❖ All reserved category students are given admission as per the policy of the State Government.

❖ The college also has a sports quota in every subject where relaxation of marks criteria is given to a student who has played at least at district level/state/national/international level.

❖ For back year candidates, migration candidates, open school and outside state schools, differently able student, college follows university guidelines

❖ All are admitted on merit subject to vacancies, as per the government and university guidelines. Although our different Departmental Heads set their subject criterion yet that this is not very much rigid but flexible because we sit together to change the prior set standard as per the further requirement of students in the respective departments.

❖ Admission to second and third year degree courses follows after the publication of their results. Till then students attend colleges and take a provisional admission. In commerce, admission is done routinely. There are two specializations offered at third year level, viz.,

Accounts and Management. In Arts and Science streams, the students are counselled to opt for a major subject, keeping in mind their interest and aptitude. Admission is given to meritorious students from other colleges, subject to availability of seats.

As per the following mentioned steps the college follows the admission process:

Step-1: Set the criterion to be followed for the admission

Step-2: Forms are issued and submitted through on line process at present

Step-3: Publication of merit list online and off line.

Step-4: Issue of a 24 hours notice for immediate correction for any mistake.

Step-5: Manual

Step-6: Process of counseling and verification is followed.

The college does not have any entrance or common test system for admission in any courses at present.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If ‘yes’ what is the outcome of such an effort; and how has it contributed towards the improvement of the processes?

There is a good mechanism to review the admission process in our college which helps a lot in this regard to have positive and improved outcomes. For this purpose, in each and every year our respected principal sir forms an admission committee which handles the admission procedure very smoothly and efficiently with their best effort and intelligence.

At the initial stage each and every department is given the responsibility in preparing the merit list of its own department. The departmental head plays the leading role with having the respective departmental teachers with him/her.

At the second stage our principal sir forms several micro committees to run the programme accurately. These micro committees cross check the merit list as prepared by the respective department.

After the above processes are over we used to have an all departments meet to review further if there are any more vacancies in any subject or subjects, if the criterion as set earlier to be loosened or not. Then we again ask new forms for admission and following same processes we fill up the vacancies. Thus we try to improve the process of admission in our college.

Note: This year 2015 admission process also has started online process and the prospectus along with a power point presentation has been made available in the college website. This mechanism has led to wider publicity for the institution and the courses, across the country and enrollment of students from other states.

Note: our college also offers and gives concessions to the needy and physically challenged students so that the weaker section of the society may be included within the education basket. The college also makes an effort to cater to the needs of the physically / visually challenged students.

2.2. Catering to Student Diversity**2.2.1: How does the institute cater to the needs of differently - abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?**

As per the policies of our West Bengal Govt. 3% seats of each category are reserved for the differently abled students. In this regard our college authority is very much conscious to follow the pre determined policies as framed by the Govt. our college strictly tries to comply with the set policies. Not only that, after the admission of such category students we keep in touch with the students in different ways like, providing voice recorder, extra classes, supplying writer in the examination, relaxation in attendance etc. The college at present has a very few students in these categories.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The institution assesses student needs during admission. At the initial level of the degree program, the institution has made provisions for assessment of the student before the commencement of the program like counseling them with their subject choices and also giving them information about the college activities .The admission committee also assesses the students' abilities related to NSS and NCC, Sports , extra - curricular activities and knowledge. Keeping in mind their career pursuits and higher education plans, they are counseled accordingly and knowledge gaps are identified. Based on this, they are counseled to choose a combination of subjects that suit their potential.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

From the end of our institution a lot of measures to mend the knowledge gap of the enrolled students are being taken in different ways.

- Incorporating the tutorial classes within our framed structure of routine so that the students can have the opportunity of discussing their areas of difficulties and can have the solution.
- Remedial classes during summer recess for the weak students to improve them further.
- There is the opportunity of joining the special grammar classes taken by Dr. Sriparna Dutta, department of English.
- Previously there would have the arrangement of communicative English classes but right now that is not arranged for the shortage of staff in this department.
- Various other strategies such as collaborative learning, departmental and inter departmental extensive lectures on their syllabus by renowned subject experts are being organized, approach writing for practical, screening of films on important issues, practice sessions for viva and practical, enriching through creative teaching like power point presentations, educational tours are organised.
- The department of Bengali and Hindi also organizes Bhasa Divas and Hindi Divas and on this occasion, talks are being given by delegates on very relevant and contemporary topic on their subjects.
- Weaker students are given time beyond class hours by their teachers, to bridge the gaps in their knowledge and improve their performance.
 - Teachers put in extra efforts to help students excel at the examinations particularly at the third year level.
 - For enriching and encouraging the students and to develop a network among student – teacher and institution as a whole, the college also organizes different kinds of programmes promoting their cultural as well as their career oriented aspects like Career Fair, Alumni Re-Union and like.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college has exclusive cells and groups for sensitizing both staff and students to gender, inclusion and environment viz., Women Cell, Counseling Cell, NSS, NCC, Cultural Committee. These societies organize events like interactive talks, lecture - demonstrations, marathons, films, debates, poster competitions, drama competition, and exhibitions on various sensitive and critical issues like environment, gender bias, social malpractices, inclusive education and inclusive growth. The faculty is sensitized to the diverse needs of the students, and the college ambience is conducive to the growth of all learners. So we have seen an improved intake of students from diverse backgrounds. Their progress is monitored and assisted by the concerned faculty. There is an increase in the enrolment of students belonging to the reserved category.

Women cell of our college is very much active to arrange different awareness programme among all the students with special focus on the female students time to time. On the other hands the counseling cell counsels the confused students to choose their right path. We also give special suggestions to the passed out students regarding their future carrier mainly arranged by the Career Counseling, Placement and Entry into Services Cell.

To maintain the premises clean our principal, Dr. Subir kumar Dutta, issues notice to the students asking them not to spit here and there. The students are also cautioned to keep them refrained from using the intoxicated items.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Through class interaction/performance, the advanced learners are identified. Faculty regularly inform them about intra and intercollegiate competitions and seminars, where they participate and their abilities are tested and honed. Teachers challenge and motivate these students to go beyond the course work and to take up small projects in institutions like model making, exhibitions etc. They are guided to present papers/posters at different fora (eg Inter-Collegiate Competitions).



Departments organize state/national and student seminars that expose them to research and paper presentation. The Entry into Services Cell sponsored by UGC of the college helps students to prepare for entrance exams for differently Competitive and Public Service Exams.



Advanced learners who are in financial needs are always given fee waivers/discounts/scholarships. Also they are being awarded with special awards on Annual Prize Distribution Day.



In each every year our college follows up the passed out students for having the job opportunities. In this regard the Placement cell of the college is actively playing an important role. At Past Prof. Dalia Pramanik was the in charge of this cell. At present Prof. Arabinda Mridha and Prof. Arup Bhattacharya are the joint in charge of this cell. At past our college arranged the career fair programme -- Udaan under the co-ordinatorship of Prof. Shilpa Nandy, Ex- Co-ordinator of Career Counseling cell. Recently there were two consecutive programme for placement of passed students arranged by Placement cell where Contemporary Companies namely Techmatrix and Merit Track came to give the assignment. A career report has also been published by this cell. We are also having our future dream to improve the job prospects further to the students.

Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

Teaching plan:

- The Head of each department frames the syllabus and gives guidelines for the teaching plan.
- Departments hold meetings to decide distribution of topics and lectures, and discuss the teaching plan.
- The college plans the academic and examination calendar.
- The grids for evaluation are based on the guidelines of the university and the teachers and students are oriented about it by the Principal and departmental teachers.
- In their first day, the students are properly being given academic calendar along with routine and also the teacher discusses with them about some relevant issues like attendance, result and examination pattern and motivates them to participate in different inner and outer college activities.

Teaching Schedule:

- There is a routine committee which prepares the college timetable in consultation with departments. Prof. Dalia Pramanik is in charge of this committee.
- Each department holds meetings at the beginning of each semester to discuss the syllabus and work out the teaching plan.
- An Academic Record Book is maintained by each teacher.
- There is flexibility to accommodate remedial lectures, extra classes and contact hours.
- Heads of the departments monitor the completion of the syllabus and ensure the overall pattern of the examination; question papers and weightage of topics are as per the recommendations of the university.

Evaluation:

- For the purpose of proper teaching or rather to teach the students in a very much systematic way each and every department of our college prepare the Academic Calendar along with the individual departmental class routine.
- In the Academic Calendar the department segments the whole syllabus into basic two parts for the first and Second term examination.
- Four unit tests as per predetermined or scheduled exam dates are taken. After each and every unit tests and the term exams we the respective subject teacher evaluate the answer scripts.
- The records or details of these results are being published also in respective college notice boards.

2.3.2: How does IQAC contributes to improve the teaching – learning process?

The IQAC is actively involved in the execution and quality control of the teaching, learning & evaluation process. IQAC enables the sharing of best practices through annual departmental/criteria presentations, innovative teaching-learning methods and discusses proposals for new programs and courses. *The in charge of IQAC cell is Dr. Sriparna Dutta, Department of English.* She takes initiative time to time making the teachers aware regarding the importance of arranging the extended lectures or exchange of thought by bringing teachers from other colleges. She also encourages for the departmental workshop and seminar. She is taking the initiative to once again start the Communicative English classes for the students of the college.

 - Shukla Bhore, Governing Body Members whose suggestions are greatly valued and implemented. At present, the councilor of the area is Sri sadhan saha who is yet to be

intimated about his membership in IQAC. It is also to mention that the external members of IQAC are not always able to attend the meetings but they always support the initiatives taken by the cell in the development of the college. IQAC also conducts SWOC evaluation of the college. The IQAC has been successful in implementation many of its suggestions like Technology aided teaching, formation of a Women Cell, CAS of teachers and the Cell plans to give more focus to research initiatives.

2.3.3 : How is learning made more student centric? Details of support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students.

A lot of techniques are being adopted by the different departments and the individual teacher for making the teaching learning process more students centric. Basically the individual teachers have their own style to make the process more and more reachable to the students. We arrange for remedial classes as per the UGC rule for the students for the deficit in them. We also take special coaching classes for the weak students. Although teacher students ratio is not so comfortable yet that we make us well equipped to make it more student centric through tutorial classes incorporated within our class routine, discussing last ten years questions, giving them suggestions, taking feedback from the students, checking home work etc.

The college puts a lot of emphasis on active and interactive learning. Teaching-learning is made student-centric by giving our students every opportunity for independent as well as collaborative learning.

Specific methods include the following:

- Assigning group projects (*Collaborative Learning*)
- Problem solving sessions - independently as well as in groups (*Independent/Collaborative Learning*)
- Use of graphs powerpoint presentation by Journalism and Mass Communication department, (*Use of ICT*)
- Creating interactive sessions in class through discussion, debates, role play, quizzes, and tutorials. (*Participative Learning*)
- Screening of movies, discussion on books (*Experiential Learning*)
- Research oriented projects like wall magazines, publications (*Experiential Learning*)
- Student seminars, participation in cultural events, annual exhibitions (*Collaborative and Experiential Learning*)
- Field trips and study tours (*Experiential Learning*)
- *Inter departmental programmes (Collaborative and Participative Learning)*
- Facilitating students to learn at their own pace and space through LCD presentation by few departments.

Support systems available:

- Library and few departmental libraries,
- Departmental laptop for teaching - learning.
- LCD Projectors

- LAN network
- Library internet connectivity
- Inter com facility
- Journalism, Geography and Commerce (IT) Lab
- Room no. 6 class room can be changed into an Audio - visual room as and when required for film screenings, seminar presentations and paper reading. However the college has plans of developing a separate AV room for this purpose.
- Project Room for Minor Research and Major Research Project
- Facilities to make Charts/Exhibits/Models by students

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

The institution nurtures critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper through planned activities in and outside the classroom. Learners are always encouraged to think out of the box and think critically. Creativity and originality of the students are brought out by innovative student-centric activities like the college magazine, departmental magazines/journals, and co-curricular/extra-curricular events. Scientific temper and critical thinking are inculcated among the learners by involving them in research meets, exhibitions* where they put up projects, models, and posters. There remain the students who like to create and innovate something. All the departmental heads encourage the students with the help of their departmental teachers by motivating the students for the wall magazine, for their novel writing in college journal – *The Light* etc. Besides this we arrange for the quiz contests, extempore etc. Our Geography department encourages their students for participating in the science exhibition. On the other hands the departments having their practical based subjects can encourage their students for the innovative nature work through the preparation of their project works which are field based. In this respect our department of commerce, department of Journalism and mass communication and department of geography can take the initiatives.

**In 2015, the department of geography participated in an inter collegiate science exhibition organised by Vidyasagar College and the college stood third in this competition.*

Creative and Scientific Temper

The students are mentored to take part in inter-collegiate competitions, seminars, model exhibitions and so on. The members of cultural committee looks after the matter with utter sincerity and efficiency. Under the guidance of this committee specially Prof. Debalina Bhattacharya, Prof. Dibydyuti Roy and many, the college in recent has been able to secured positions in this competitions. The co-curricular and extra-curricular activities prepare the students for learning organizational and leadership skills which prepare them to work in a multi-cultural & global scenario. Thus the culture and climate of the institution enables students to be lifelong learners and innovators.

Critical Thinking

The class tests and semester end examinations require them to comment, analyze, evaluate, compare, and interpret facts through which their critical thinking abilities are challenged. The faculty motivates and mentors students in their research, projects and paper presentations. The

creativity and innovation of the teachers are acknowledged. We know and we believe that there remains the prospect among the students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Use of ICT tools has a positive effect on student learning. Our college is always aware of the global changes and for this reason our each and every department is well equipped with the modern tools and technologies. In case of the department of commerce there is a designed course curriculum in this regard. There is a special paper named as E- Commerce. To teach this subject we have our subject expert, Prof. Tapan Kumar Dutta. Department of Commerce also has the paper “Information Technologies” which is a computer based subject. This department has a special project paper where we give the students training to make them habituate in using power point, excel, animation and also learn them how prepare the graphs pie-chart bar diagram, line chart etc. in this regard our department of geography and department of Journalism and Mass Communication are also at the fore front. Some of the technologies/facilities used by faculty for effective teaching are Microscopes with projector attachment and Laptops & LCDs for an Audio – Visual Presentation.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

To make the students as well as the faculties well aware with the advanced level of knowledge and skills different departments of our college arrange for the departmental seminars and workshops all through the years. For the exchange of thoughts we also arrange for the extend lectures delivered by the teachers of other colleges. To make himself or herself well acquainted with the changes and to adjust with the advancement of education our faculties participate in Oriented programme and Refresher Courses time to time sponsored by UGC. 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

For the better guidance to the students the teacher counsels the students during their course of study as well as after the course of study through the follow up process they adopt. The department also keeps record of the students. At the very initial stages the students are given suggestion in choosing their subject for having a better combination so that they can reach at the door point of a job for competition. Some time the students who are irregular are also being counseled in presence of their guardians to make them regular. The department thus stops the drop out tendency among the students. Besides the college also arranges different placement opportunity for the students by bringing and collaborating with different companies and the department teachers also inform the present incumbents and are being motivated in this process.

Although the college does not have specified Psycho- social cell but the teachers often play a dominant role whenever a student needs counseling or any kind of support – personal and professional.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The teachers of this college take a deep interest in the academic orientation of the students. The basic objective behind teaching methodology is to maximise student performance. The teachers strictly follow the academic calendar prepared by them at the beginning of each academic year. There is a very healthy co-ordination between the teachers and the students and this facilitates learning. Another major advantage that helps the students is teacher accessibility beyond the boundary of the classroom - - the students are most welcome to come to the teachers any time, within the college hours, with their problems.

The teachers of this college gives priority to update its students by collecting data and information from internet and also insists the students to browse important internet sites related to their studies. Besides the teachers also have adopted following modern methods of making the classroom teaching more interesting and interactive. The methods are as follows:

❖ Audio- Visual Presentation:

In order to make the learning process more interesting and interactive the classes are often conducted by the projector. *For example, the department of History in the last academic session started a new process of learning by making their students presentation with the help of projector. Their theme was “A Journey Through the Ages”* The classes of the department of Journalism and Mass Communication , Geography and IT part of Commerce are also being conducted with the help of computers. These departments have separate computer laboratories.

❖ Educational Tours:

As per CU norms the Geography department of the college conducts an excursion tours every year for their students as part of their course requirement. But the department of *Political Science and Education also started conducting educational tours since 2012. Last year, the department of History visited Indian Museum as part of educational tour. The department of English visited Birla Museum and Technology. The department of Political Science visited Bidhan Sabha and the department was joined by JMC, Hindi and Education department of the college. Also another educational tour was jointly conducted by the department of Journalism and Mass Communication and Political Science to Birla Museum.* Apart from Geography, these tours are sometimes totally financially supported by college and sometimes they are self- financed tours by the departments.

❖ Inter departmental Programmes:

In order to enrich the campus life and develop quality teaching among the students, the departments like Journalism and Mass Communication and Political Science organised last year an extension lecture on *”Communication Theory”*. *The lecture was delivered by Prof. Sourav Gupta, Koratput University, Odisha.* Besides the educational tours are also

glaring examples of inter departmental networking and collaborative programmes and provides the scope of knowing each other well and thereby building a sense of community participation among them.

❖ **Film Screening:**

Another new mode of teaching adopted by few departments of the college is to show films to the students relevant and based on the theme related to their course. For example, the department of English organises Classic English Movies; the department of JMC prepares and shows documentary and short films. Last year the department of Political Science organised a film screening “*Madras Café*” for their students on This movie was also watched by the different departments of the college. In showing the movie, the JMC department assisted the Political Science department. Another example of inter – departmental programmes.

❖ **Dramatised Version of Teaching:**

The department of Hindi has adopted new process of teaching and learning in the way of drama enactment on a piece or novel based on and from their syllabus. For example, in recent past a drama was enacted by the department students on the piece named “*Bholaram ka Jeev*”. The drama was enacted on the occasion of Swami Vivekananda’s 150th Anniversary Programme.

❖ **Inter departmental classes**

The teachers of one department are invited to take classes of another department. For example the teachers of political science and history were requested to take classes of the students of English honours on topics like political thought of Locke, Rousseau and French Revolution respectively. The teachers of Bengali and Hindi departments take classes in areas more pertinent to their field of study.

❖ **Wall Magazine:**

These magazines are for students. The students are assisted and insisted by the teachers to enhance their creative mind and talents in form of these magazines where they are required to search materials from internet, showcase thought provoking write-ups and information. Different department have their own wall magazines. The names of the wall magazines are as follows:

2.3.9: How are the Library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

As a part of continuous assessment, students are given assignments and projects for which referencing is essential. They are required to add a bibliography of the sources used for the same.

Advanced learners are assigned research projects on topics beyond the syllabus. This again demands the extensive use of library resources. Some departments have their own libraries. The departments of English and Political Science maintain record of the books available in the college library.

Our library has grown over the years. With funds available from UGC the departments have been able to update the library with latest books in the market. However, while purchasing books the departments keep in mind the needs of the students.

In our Library different journals are being subscribed keeping in mind the job, research and information area of the students like EPW, India Today, Competition Success etc.

Honours students are allowed to issue five books at a time and general stream students can issue up to three books at a time.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The departments of the college provide the students with an academic calendar at the beginning of every academic session. The purpose behind academic calendar is to make the students aware of their syllabus as well as inform the students the time frame within which topics will be covered.

All the departments maintain their own 'academic record book'. This book acts as a ready reference for the teachers of a particular department to know what topic has been discussed by the other departmental faculties.

The departmental heads are very particular about the coverage of syllabus and try to ensure that timely completion of the same takes place. Moreover the Principal of the college visits departments and collects feedbacks from the students regarding completion of syllabus.

At times the departments face the challenge of getting the syllabus completed within time. The departmental teachers take extra classes and finish the syllabus within the stipulated time. The college authority is very supportive in this matter and welcomes every step initiated by the teachers to facilitate the students.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Evaluation of teaching learning process takes place at various levels –

- ❖ The departmental record book is checked by the principal of the college to ensure that the departments are performing as committed to their students.
- ❖ Departmental visits by the Principal also are very effective in this regard. The principal is able to collect first hand information from the students about the teaching learning strategies adopted by the departmental teachers and dissemination of the same.
- ❖ Annual Parents – teachers' Meet is another medium through which the college can evaluate the teaching learning given to the students. Parents being stakeholders of the

college provide feedback in these meetings and such suggestions are carefully noted to be incorporated as and when required.

- ❖ The IQAC of the college conducts an annual evaluation of the college by the students of third year. the outcome of such evaluation is discussed in the IQAC meetings and also placed before the Governing Body of the college. The Academic Committee of the college also monitors the teaching learning strategies adopted by the departments and offers suggestions for betterment of the same.

The college is totally dependent on West Bengal College Service Commission for the appointment of full time teachers. However, in order to meet the demand of shortage of teaching staff the college appoints ‘guest lecturers’ from time to time. At present the college has 18 guest lecturers in different subjects. These teachers are paid from the college fund and care is taken to revise their pay provided the college is able to bear the financial burden. These teachers are equally important in coming up with suggestions as far as departmental matters are concerned. The college tries to provide a healthy atmosphere so that they can contribute to the well being of the department.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The college is dependent on West Bengal College Service Commission for the appointment of full time teachers. Guest teachers are appointed by the college with the help of Calcutta University.

The departments arrange different departmental seminars time to time by inviting speakers from Universities and from other institution. The department of Political Science invited Prof.Sovonlan Dutta Gupta to deliver his lecture on the topic Rosa Luemburg debate.

Similarly Dr. Ram Prahlad , Dr. Asis Sana, Dr. D. Dandapat came from University of Calcutta in the Department of Commerce to deliver their lectures on “ Avenues of Investments and SEBI vigilance”, “ Stock Exchange and its Roll in share market” and “ How to make a Project Paper” respectively. Besides this Dr. CR. Karmakar, is visiting faculty in the Department of Commerce. He is from Dum Dum Motijhil College of Commerce and is also associated with University of Barasat, West Bengal.

The department of Journalism and Mass Communication conducted workshops where resource persons had come from The Telegraph and Hindustan Times.

The college is totally supportive in all academic endeavours of the teachers. However the college authority is very particular in one aspect – any teacher involved in any academic activity must ensure that his / her departmental work is not hampered in any way.

The teachers of the college are yet to receive such accolades.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC of the college conducts annual evaluation of college including teachers, non – teaching staff, and infrastructure by the students. This evaluation encompasses teaching learning given to the students, extra facilities provided to the students by the teachers, taking interest in their learning abilities.

This evaluation has helped the departments improve their standards as become aware where they fall short of their commitment.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1: How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process?

The students are made aware of the evaluation process followed by the college and University in the following ways –

- The students get their Prospectus at the time of admission. The prospectus contains the details about the exam pattern followed by Calcutta University and the evaluation system practiced by the college at the internal level.
- At the beginning of each academic session the college arranges an inaugural ceremony. The Principal of the college in his inaugural speech repeats the pattern of evaluation followed by the college.
- The departments provide academic calendar to the students. this academic calendar apart from focusing on coverage of syllabus tries to incorporate internal exam schedule.
- At times it is not possible to mention the exam schedule in the academic calendar. The college on a later date circulates the schedule in the form of Notice and the same is also put up on the college Notice Board.
- The teachers in their classes also inform the students about exam dates and assignments to be submitted.
- The teachers decide upon such dates in an internal meeting and the same is forwarded to the Academic Committee for approval. However such an approval is just a formality as the Academic Committee is supportive of all efforts taken by teachers to improve teaching learning.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The college has adopted the evaluative pattern followed by Calcutta University as the college is affiliated to this University.

The college has, on its own, initiated certain reforms –

- The college decides upon cut off marks that a student has to secure in order to sit for Calcutta University exam. As the CU minimum marks is 35% for honours student the college ensures that students obtain at least this minimum to be eligible to sit for CU exam. For students in general stream the minimum percentage required is 30%. However certain relaxations are made for students who are participating in sports, medical grounds and other unforeseen incidents.
- Apart from following exam pattern of CU the college has designed its own system of conducting Unit Tests and class assignments.
- The college is very particular about attendance of the students. Students who do not have attendance percentage as mentioned by CU (75% with relaxation up to 60% on paying non – collegiate fine) are not allowed to sit for the College Test held in the months of February and March for second year and first year respectively.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

As prescribed and scheduled by the university we take the respective tests in time, we evaluate the answer scripts and we publish the results also. As far as dates of exam are concerned Calcutta University has a pre-determined scheduled date which is circulated to the colleges at the beginning of each academic year. This Circular mentions the dates when the colleges have to conduct College Test for all the three years. Any change in these dates are also notified by the University in the form of Circular and is also uploaded in the University website.

The college strictly adheres to the schedule prepared by Calcutta University and fixes its own internal exam dates accordingly.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

In our institution basically there are arrangements of two internal exams which are termed as 1st Term and 2nd Term exam which may be termed as the formative and summative assessment. The formative or 1st Term exam has been re-segmented into Unit-I, Unit-II, Unit-III and Unit-IV respectively. As per our observation we are sure that there is a positive impact of the Unit tests on the mind of the students who get conscious enough after the 1st Unit test having the result in their hands.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc)

The college has adopted many ways measures to initiate improvement of the students.

- ❖ **One such measure is unit tests.** The departments put a lot of emphasis on these Unit Tests. As already mentioned these tests are conducted on the basis of syllabus completion. The result of these tests are published either on departmental boards and if that is not done the students are shown their test papers. In fact some departments also show the test papers to the guardians in Parents – teachers’ Meet. A copy of the test result is handed over to the Principal of the college.
- ❖ **As the college believes in complete development of a student apart from academics the behavior of students are closely monitored by departmental teachers.** What is unique to this college is the student teacher ratio. Teachers are shrewd observers of how their students behave and interact with other members of the college.
- ❖ **Students are taught to be independent learners.** The teachers do not encourage learning by rote and follow the practice of getting students involved in the class. This is done by making the students do a little research on the topic to be taught in class. Students are encouraged to ask questions and show curiosity.
- ❖ **Communication skill is not just the ability to be fluent in language.** It encompasses a number of other issues like being articulate, precise and well spoken. Though the college does not have separate grooming classes for enhancing a student’s communication skill the teachers through their interaction with students try to, at least indirectly, touch upon this area.
- ❖ **As far as communication skill in language is concerned the department of English conducted Communicative English classes for the students.** Due to unavoidable circumstances this course could not be conducted last two sessions but the department plans to begin this again from academic session 2016 – 17.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The college have high aspiration for its graduates, and in the pursuit of this academic mission, the teachers constantly endeavour to provide them employment-related skills, life skills, and nurture attitudes and dispositions through curricular and co-curricular activities. In keeping with our vision of providing quality education, highly qualified faculties strive to promote global competencies and research culture in the students.

The Khudiram Bose Central College graduate attributes are the academic abilities, personal qualities and dispositions, and generic and transferable skills. These core values provide a basis for engaging with the world and it permeates our approach to student engagement within the framework of the Calcutta University guidelines and the curriculum. But they transcend the discipline specific contexts in which they were originally acquired. These life skills, attributes, and effective attitudes towards knowledge, learning, community, and work are things which the college wants to inculcate in the students

The three essential dimensions of our students are

Personal Growth which will make them specialists in their chosen discipline, effective communicators, with ability to apply discipline specific knowledge in solving problems in different contexts.

Enquiry & Life-long learning which includes intellectual curiosity, critical thinking abilities, scientific temper, ability to create, understand and analyse knowledge.

Global outlook and Community Engagement which equips them with the ability to work in any context, cutting across cultural or regional boundaries, ethically evaluate ones work in a global context, and to be aware of sustainability issues.

Our students are expected to be graduates who are self-reliant, specialists in their chosen discipline, continuous learners, effective communicators, respectful of different cultures, socially responsible, aware of their social and civic responsibilities, sensitive to gender issues with zero tolerance towards sexual harassment, and environmentally conscious. So the students, through their stay in Khudiram Bose Central College, are given ample opportunities to develop and nurture these qualities. Through participation in the activities of co-curricular societies, NSS, NCC, Women Cell, Participation in Debates. Quizzes and other cultural activities through cultural committee, the students are sensitized to social issues. They also participate in governance through their representation on the Student Council, Governing Body and IQAC.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

- For all examinations (college/University), the student can get a photocopy of the answer sheet after paying a prescribed amount as per university norms after which a student can apply for re-evaluation of the paper.
- Students also have the facility of RTI where they are given the photocopy of their desired answerscripts after a prescribed fee payment.
- Teachers are approachable and student friendly and encourage all students to communicate their concerns through formal and informal channels throughout the year.
- The institution and the University have a Student's Welfare Cell to which they can appeal if necessary.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes', give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The institution has the overall objective of developing higher order critical thinking, leadership qualities and community engagement among students. The institutional learning outcomes are employability, holistic education, citizenship behaviour, leadership qualities which are envisaged in our mission statement. The course/programs indicate learning outcomes in the syllabus. Learning outcomes express the knowledge, skill-set, and their application that students will acquire as a consequence of completing their programmes. The teachers are aware of these as they attend various meetings and syllabus framing workshops. Students are made aware of these through the college website, library and through an introduction in the first learning hour.

The IQAC initiated an exercise to map the learning objectives of the course to the overall objectives of the college. The institutional learning outcomes are in sync with the graduate attributes which are clearly articulated in the college policy document. All classroom and campus activities (**as stated in 2.5.6**) are planned to nurture these attributes in our students.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results/achievements (Programme/course -wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The internal and external assessment outcomes are communicated through mark sheets. Results are also put up on the notice boards. Each department monitors students' progress after Midterm tests and test before Final at regular intervals. The mechanism of informal

communication and feedback available from the assignments/class tests is communicated to individual students in the classroom. Departments conduct PTA meetings to share the analysis with parents especially in cases where the student is falling short of the expected standards or potential. Re-orientation is given to the students at the time of first test result outcome. Subject specific counseling to the students regarding their performance, the grading and examination systems are provided by teachers. Remedial measures are taken to address shortfall and improve the performance.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Overall Structure:

- The institution recognizes that to achieve the learning outcomes teaching, learning & assessment must happen both in the class room and also as a continuous process through college life and outside.
- The structure includes an academic calendar, teaching plans, departmental meetings, teacher record book and exam calendar.
- There is an emphasis on academic activities, co-curricular activities and field activities.
- Departmental societies take teaching-learning beyond the class room. The academic calendar gives the overall plan at the beginning of the year for academic and co-curricular activities. A balance is maintained so that academic and other activities do not clash with each other.
- Besides grades and marks, there are many awards and scholarships which acknowledge achievement of learning outcomes and motivate students toward higher benchmarks.

Strategies:

❖ Teaching strategies:

- i) Syllabus framed by the University of Calcutta is periodically upgraded.
- ii) Knowledge is disseminated through lectures, group activities (like field visit project/ wall magazine etc), learner sensitive instruction (different cell activities), independent learning (Paper Presentation), collaborative learning (Inter – departmental classes) and use of ICT.
- iii) The delivery mechanism is geared to incorporate latest research, technology, and cross cultural aspects.
- iv) Public lectures, industrial visits, field visits aim to take the teaching beyond the class room and syllabus.
- v) Strategies like remedial teaching, tutorials, mentoring and competitive exam and career counselling classes are aimed at inclusive teaching practices.

❖ **Learning strategies:**

Learning strategies aim to make learning an active process.

- i) In class rooms: note taking, asking questions, solving problems and writing answers, oral presentation, critiquing a concept or theory.
- ii) In laboratory/practicals: Report writing, PPT Designing (JMC), Mapping(Geography) and ICT (Commerce) learning
- iii) Independent learning: Individual assignment, field based projects, use of ICT to utilize internet resources.
- iv) Collaborative learning: Peer learning, group assignments, interactive learning through inter departmental classes/workshops etc
- v) Learning on the field: industrial visits and excursions and educational tours

❖ **Assessment strategies:**

- i) Formative assessment for feedback
- ii) Evaluation of knowledge/cognitive domain: concept testing, quizzes, Tests
- iii) Evaluation of affective domain: Value based questions in written examination
- iv) Evaluation of behavioural domain: Evaluation of practicals, observation charts, field visit reports.
- v) Summative assessment:
- vi) Theory Examinations: Setting question papers to test the concept and higher order thinking skills like critical analysis and evaluation.
- vii) Practical Examinations: Experiments to test the understanding of the concepts and honing laboratory skills.

Thus these strategies ensure that the learning outcomes, which are central to the teaching-learning process, are achieved.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The institution has an active placement cell for students across faculties. It also facilitates mock interviews, CV writing and group discussions to develop employability skills amongst them. The institution also have Career Counseling and Entry into Services cell. Students are actively involved by way of developing entrepreneurship skills and by being student entrepreneurs on campus.

The institution encourages student research skills. The research work is presented at national, international and University level research competitions/forums. *For eg. The Students of Geography Department stood third in inter college Science Exhibition this year.* Discipline specific skills and applications are developed through the activities of departmental associations.

The various co-curricular and the extracurricular societies help to develop soft skills, life skills, organizational and management skills and talent. NSS, NCC, Cultural Committee, Women Cell help develop the skills for community engagement.

The data and statistical analysis of the results is shared by the Principals to the respective departments. Faculty does formative assessment through ungraded tests/assignments and class discussions to analyze student understanding. Feedback is given to students to overcome learning barriers and teachers re-plan the session. Remedial sessions, tutorials, and other methods are used to help weaker students remove bottlenecks. Parent – teachers meeting are done. Personal counseling is also done by teachers if they find a student having learning difficulties.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Formative assessment methods are used to get feedback and teachers replan lessons. Remedial action is taken as and when required. Students are given varied platforms to improve and hone their skills. Like:

- ❖ Remedial classes,
- ❖ student presentations,
- ❖ tutorials,
- ❖ problem-solving,
- ❖ group assignments, etc are used to monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes.

Remedial teaching is conducted by the departments whenever required. Workshops and extension lectures on a topic related to their syllabus by expert on the subject are organized by the departments.

Khudiram Bose Central College is recognized for its academic excellence and holistic education. The college promotes a research culture amongst the faculty and students.

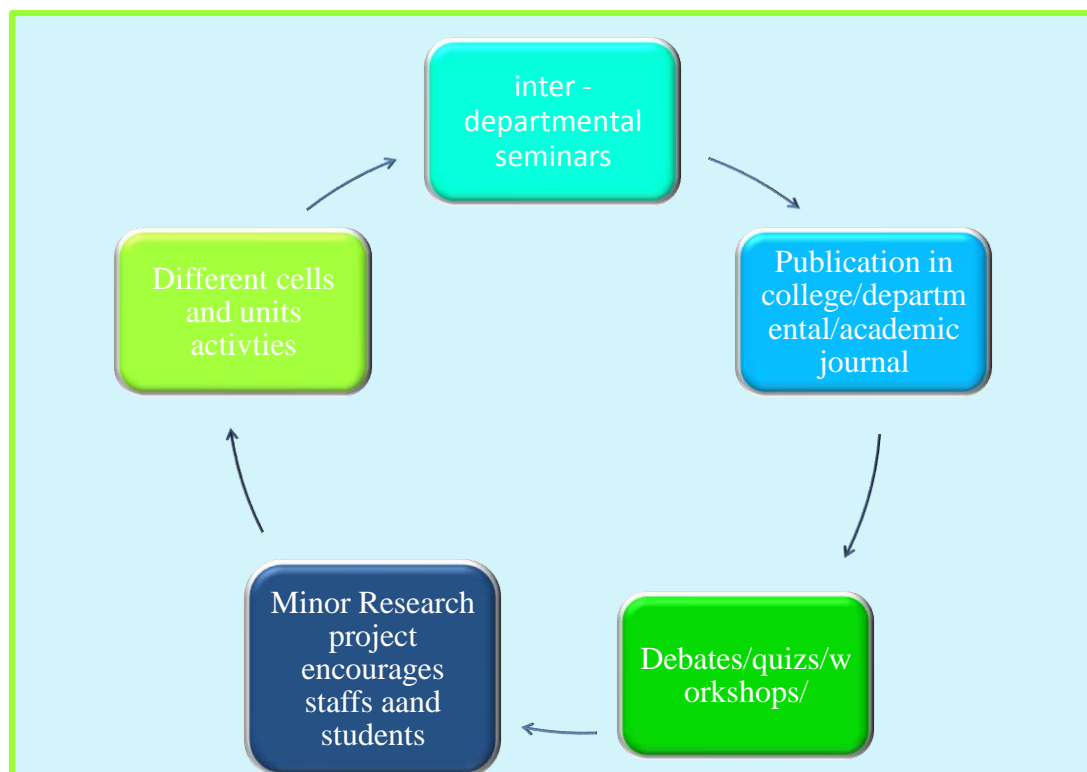

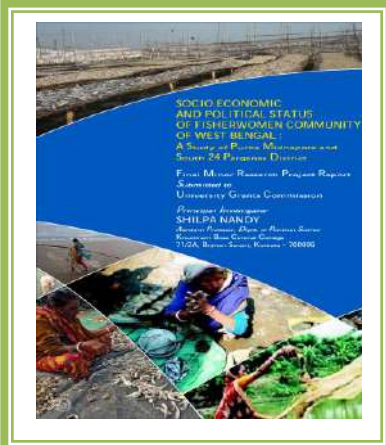

- Different proposals are also being sent to concerned department for holding youth led out reach programmes within the college premises like a proposal was sent to Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth development, Tamil Nadu for holding a youth led ououtreach programme titled '*SIGN YOUTH, SHINER INDIA*'. *Also students participate under programmes held by Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs and Youth Development, West Bengal like Quiz/Debates/Youth Parliament Competition.*

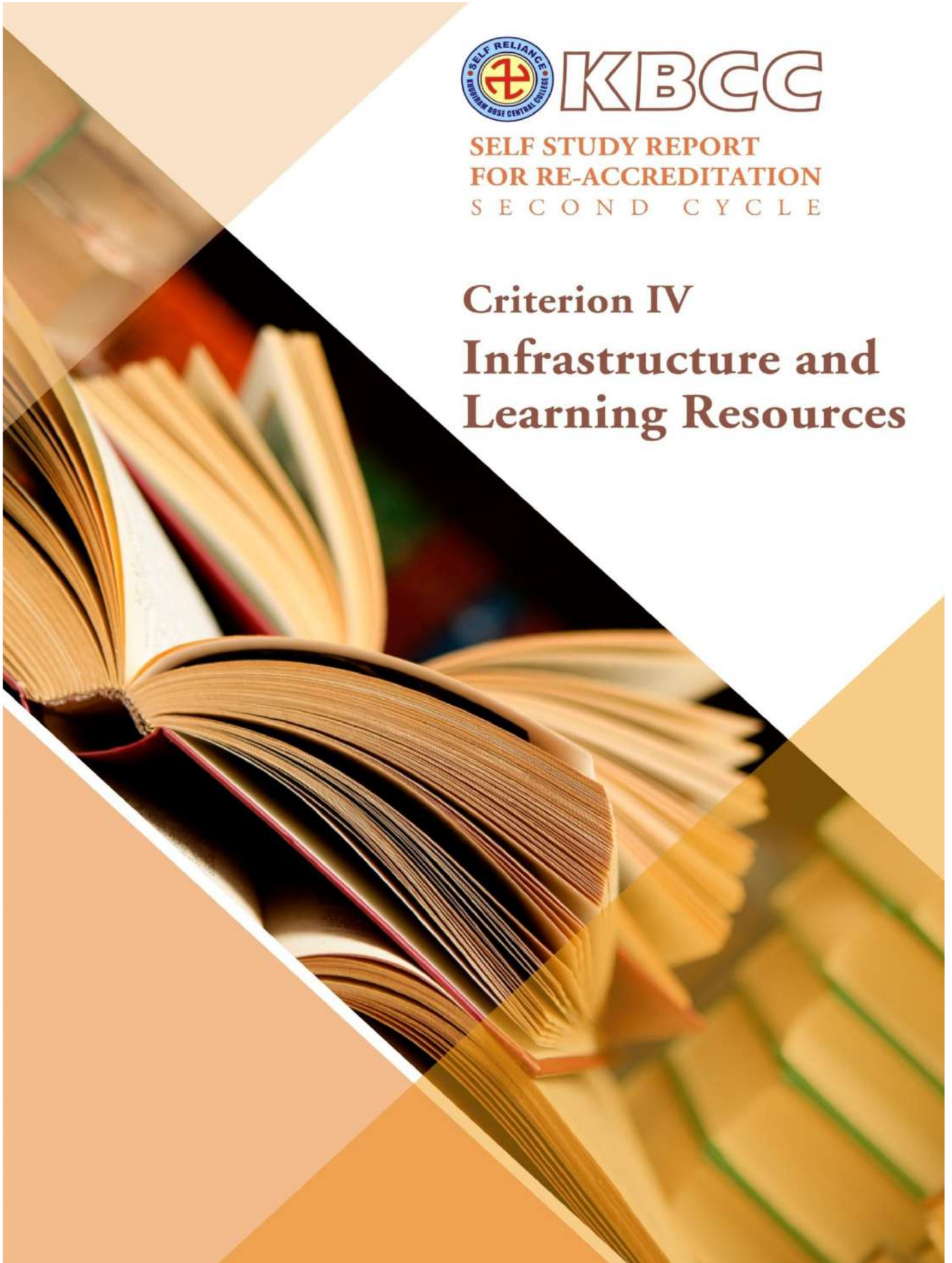

4.1 Physical Facilities:

4.1.1 - What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college management, that is the Governing Body, believes in academic and administrative expansion within the college. To achieve this there has to be continuous upgradation of infrastructure available to the students and also the teachers. Moreover the facilities provided by the college to the students need to be at par with the times. The institution supports the use of technology where effective learning is concerned and for this purpose, every year during preparation of college budget money is allocated for development of infrastructure.

The college suffers from acute shortage of space but within its limited geographical area sincere effort is made to give the best. To create new classrooms some rooms have been partitioned and construction is in process for creation of some additional space.

Support to the departments in the form of laptops, LCD projector, almirahs and internet connectivity have made some of the departments moderately self sufficient.

The policy as far as infrastructure is concerned is one of continuous development to facilitate teaching learning.

The infrastructural facilities available for conducting the curricular and co-curricular activities are as follows:

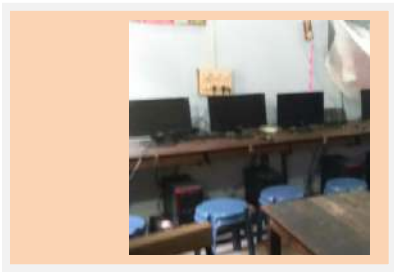
The college is not only keen about academic performance of a student but is also dedicated to ensure development of the humane qualities of a student. Service to society is not only enhanced but diligently and religiously practiced in this college.

(a) Facilities under Curricular activities:

✚ **Classrooms** – at present there are 12 classrooms functional in the college. With the construction of another floor there will be at least four more class rooms available to the students.

✚ **Technology enabled learning spaces** – the college does not have any space earmarked for this purpose. But whenever any department wants to use LCD projector there are arrangements to facilitate this.

✚ **Laboratories** – the departments of Journalism and Mass Communication, Commerce and Geography have their own labs.



✚ **Seminar hall** - improvised

(b) Facilities under co-curricular activities:

✚ **Sports:** for the last three years the college is making an effort to seriously introduce sports within its internal curriculum. To achieve this college during the time of admission relaxes the minimum marks criteria decided by the college so that good sports people get interested. This norm has been made to help good sports persons pursue their undergraduate studies. Our students have won accolades at University level, state level and also national level.

✚ **Outdoor and Indoor Games**– the college does not have the facility of possessing its own playground. However for this purpose the college uses any one of the two playgrounds available near the locality. All outdoor sports activities are held there. Outdoor games include football and cricket tournaments and Annual Sports Meet. Indoor games comprises mainly carom and table tennis.

✚ **Gymnasium** – till now there is no provision of a gymnasium.

✚ **Auditorium** – an auditorium has been newly constructed

✚ *The NCC and NSS* units of this college cater to the development of a student's social responsibility. Students learn to shoulder responsibility through community service and this helps them to grow as members of the society.

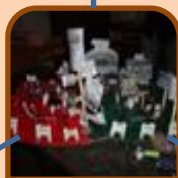
✚ **NSS** – the NSS provides ample scope to teachers and students to engage in extension activities like community and social service. Every year National Youth day is celebrated with much fanfare to remind the youths of their wider responsibilities as citizens of this country.

✚ **NCC** – the NCC wing of the college is under the 19th Bengal Battalion, Unit 2.

✚ **Cultural activities** – the college has a Cultural Committee to look after the multiple cultural activities in which the college engages itself. Students participate not only in the cultural activity hosted by the college like Annual College Social, but also take part in many competitions organized by other colleges.

- ✚ **Public speaking** – this facility is yet to be thought upon.
- ✚ **Communication skill development** – the department of English took upon itself the responsibility of conducting spoken English classes for the students of this college. The department will once again start these classes from the academic session 2016-17.
- ✚ **Health and Hygiene**- Khudiram Bose Central College is an institutional member of Students' Health Home. The college makes arrangement for the students to avail themselves of modern and free treatment facilities in the students' health home at heavily subsidized rate. *The nearest centre is S.A.Jaipuria College.* The students get medical advice in different fields ---- Eye, Dental, ENT, Skin, Orthopedics, Neurology, Cardiology, Psychiatry, Gynecology, Medicine and Surgery. *The health home is open from 4.00 p.m to 6.00 p.m. Monday to Friday and from 3.00 p.m to 5.00 p.m on Saturday.* The college has made its campus 'no smoking zone' and students are prohibited from chewing and spitting any type of pan masalas. Anyone found committing this nuisance is seriously reprimanded. The Students' Union of the college arrange health camps and blood donation camps where free blood test, medical checkup are arranged. Besides, the college also arranges special awareness campaigns on health and hygiene.

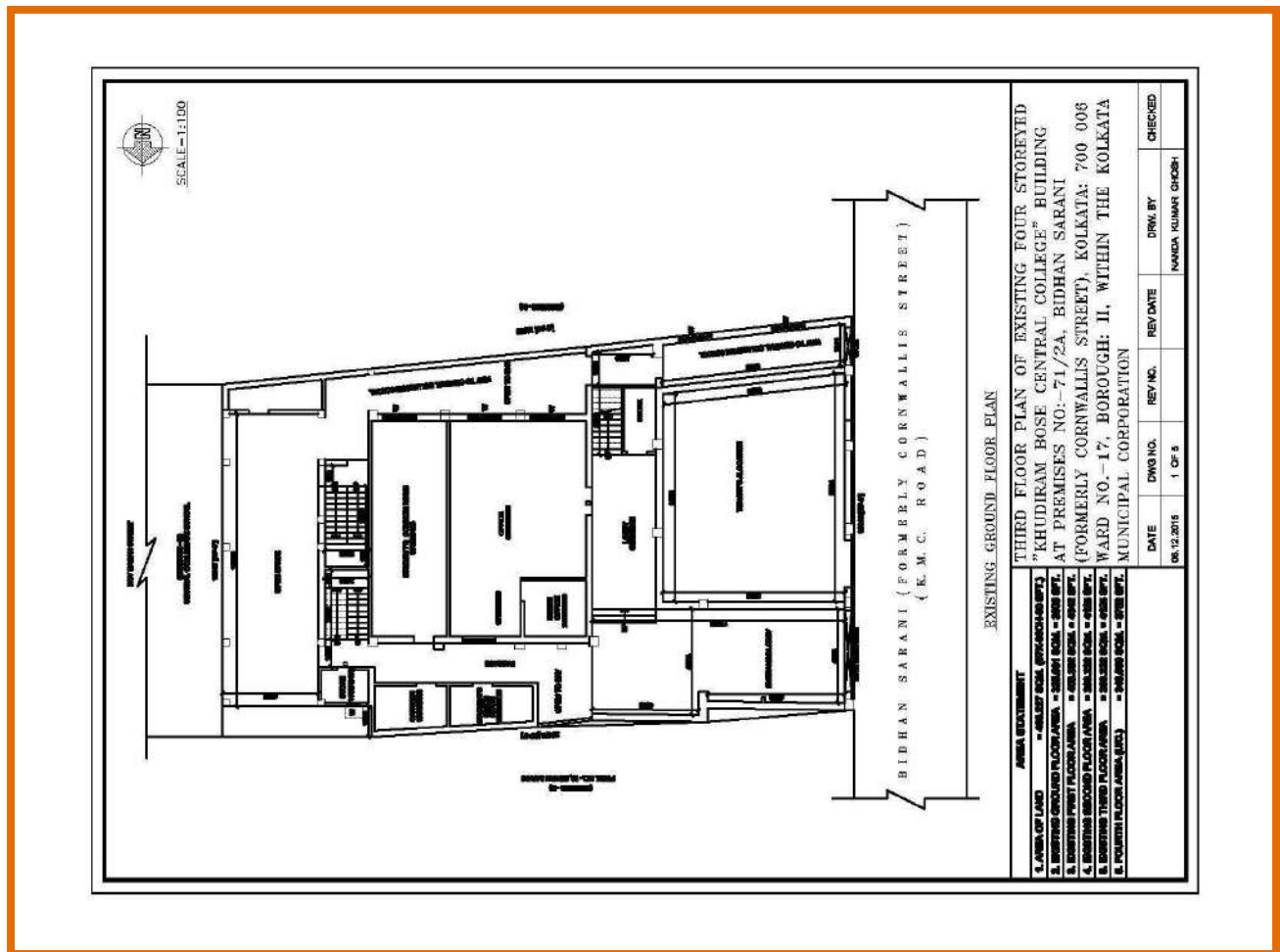

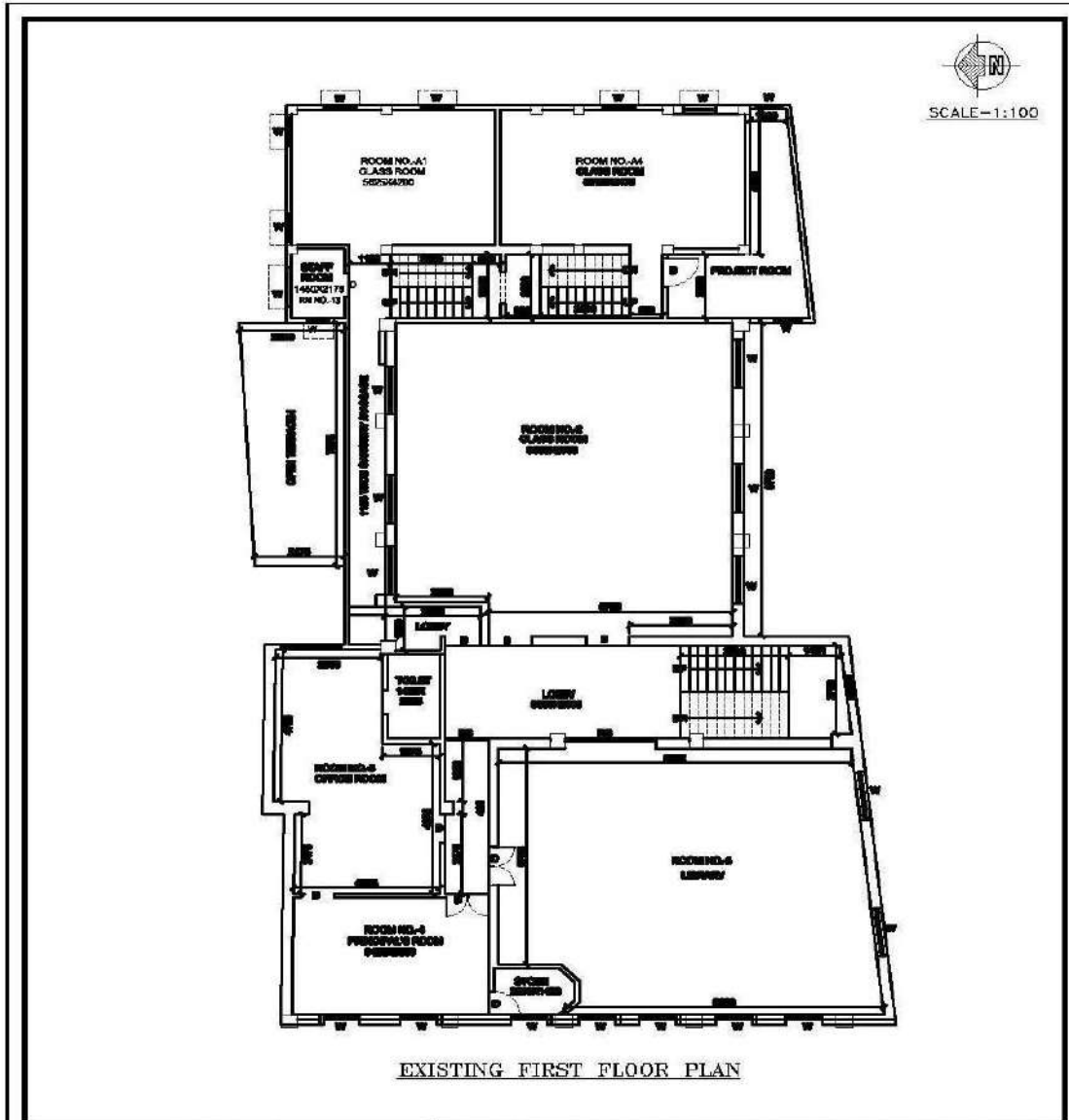

Ground Floor



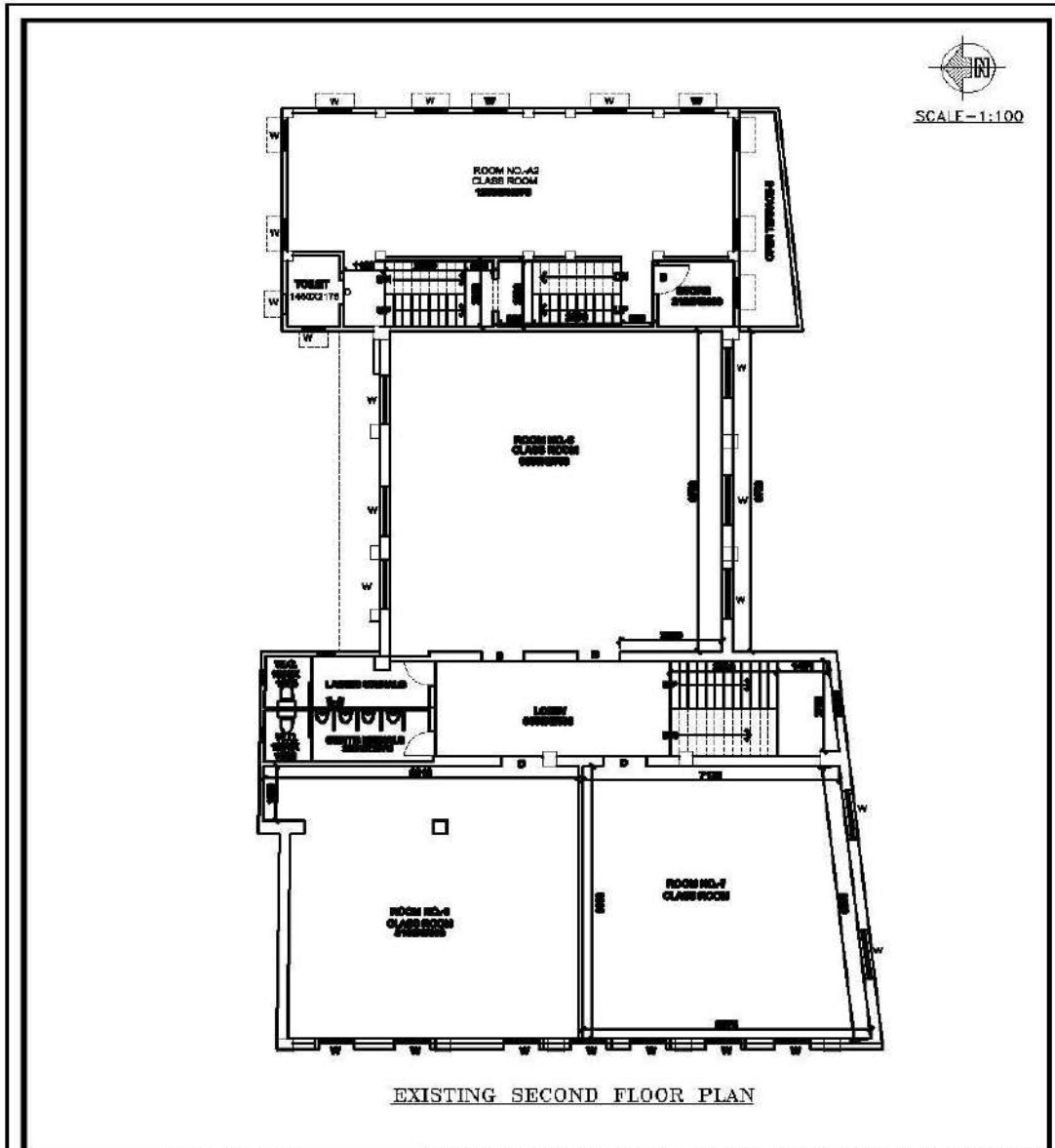

EXISTING FIRST FLOOR PLAN

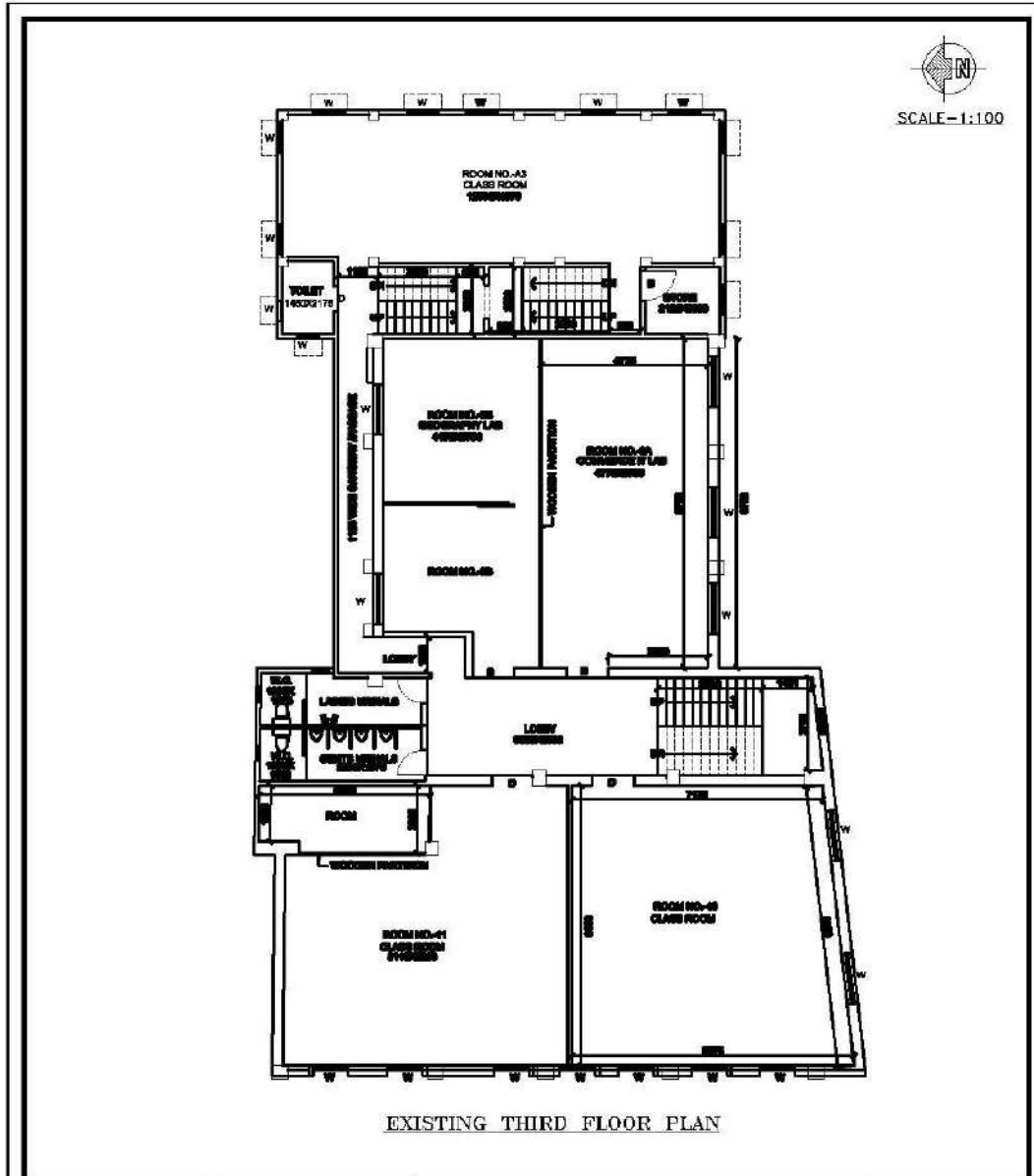

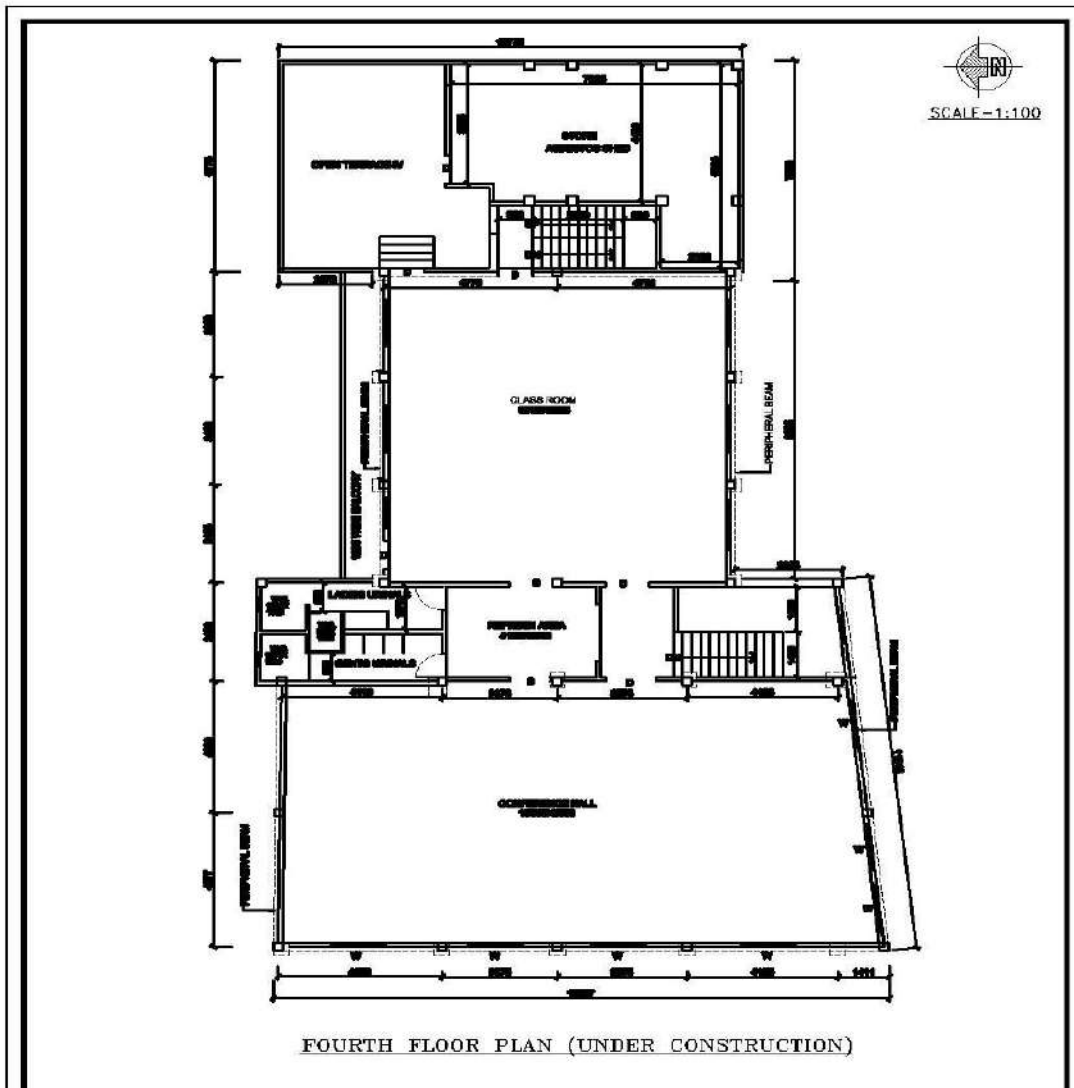


EXISTING THIRD FLOOR PLAN

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource:

'A library is the delivery room for the birth of ideas, a place where history comes to life'.

The college library tries to provide information to the students for developing their sphere of knowledge. The collection is in keeping with subjects of humanities, social science, commerce and geography.

The central library of the college is well equipped with large number of books and journals for the use of students. There is a big reading room where students can sit and study. Besides almost all departments of the college also have their own library wherefrom the students are also benefited.



Library subscribes five newspaper daily amongst which two are Bengali and three English daily distributed at the Faculty Staff Room, College corridor (In front of the college office), Library Reading room and the Principal's room. Library also subscribes two employment related news papers. Beside this college library also subscribes magazines and journals like Dosh, Economic Political Weekly, Competition Success Review, and The Management Accountant for the use of teachers and students.

4.2.1. Does the Library have an Advisory Committee? Specify the composition of such a committee. What significant initiatives have been implemented by the committee to render the library, student/ user friendly?

Yes.

Since the retirement of the College Librarian on 31.12.2010 and appointment of New Librarian from College Service Commission on 14.11.2014 there was a Committee headed by one teacher to look after the affairs of the library.

In September 2015, a new Library Advisory Committee was formed which comprises the following members -

- i) The Principal as the Chairperson,
- ii) The Librarian as the Convener,
- iii) Tapasi Ghosh as Secretary
- iv) Teacher's Council Secretary
- v) Teacher representative associated with UGC and NAAC work
- vi) One senior office staff
- vii) Library assistant
- viii) General Secretary, Students Union

Full time teachers are allowed to issue ten books for their home issue while part time teachers and guest lecturers are allowed five and two books respectively for their home issue.

New books are purchased utilizing both UGC, Non UGC Grants keeping in mind the effectiveness of collection development. Library takes care of preservation and accession of the books.

Books are arranged maintaining classification order as well as an up to date card catalogue is maintained. DDC 22 edition is used for classifying library books.

Library Circulation is manually maintained and a process of Computerization of library resources is going on. Though the books are kept under closed door shelves, still students are always allowed to surf books in the book racks before issuance of the book. Students are always assisted by the library staffs.

Pest control is done in every winter vacation.

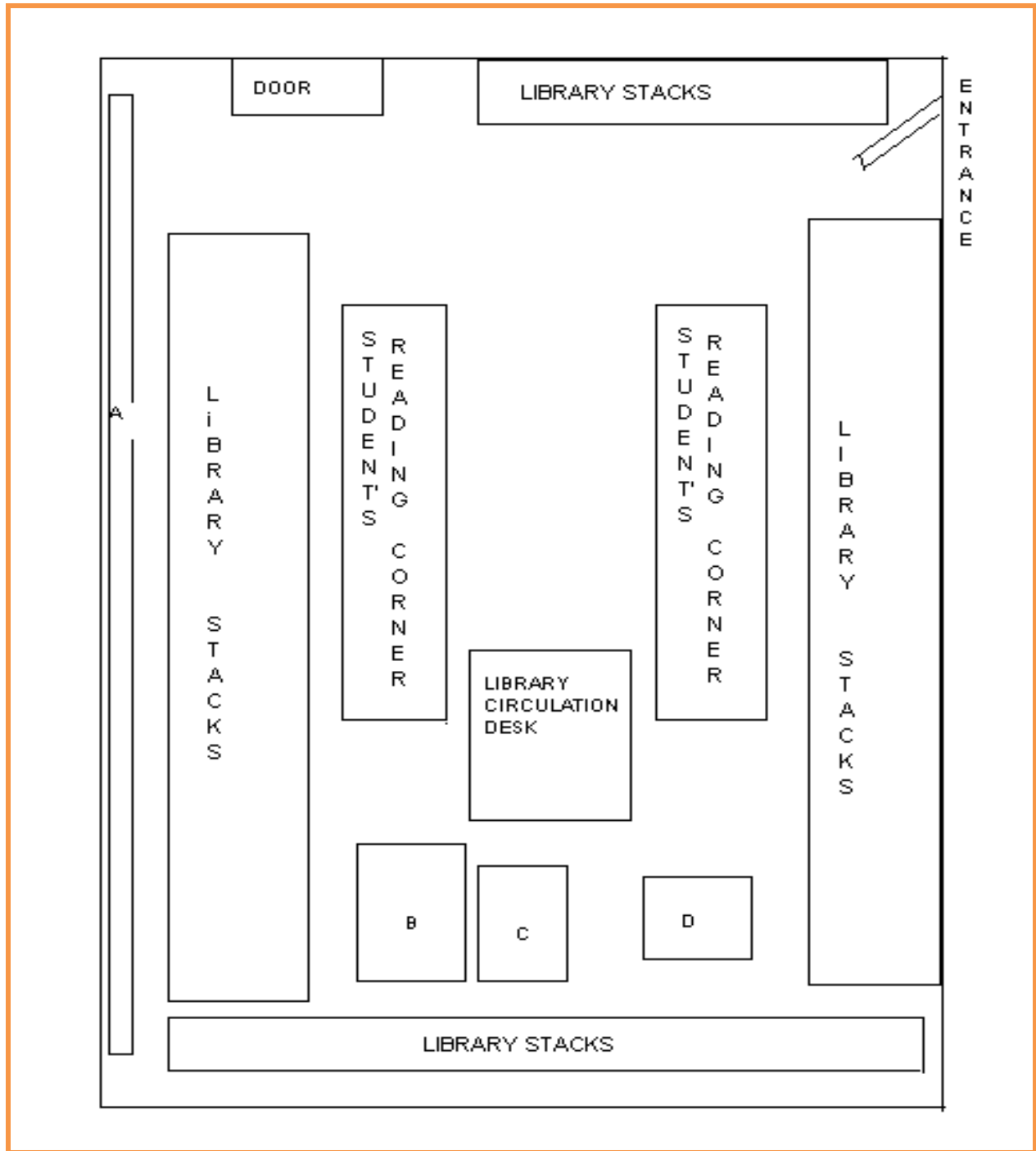

4.3.5: Extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer –aided teaching/learning process:

The college has started taking steps towards use of ICT for not only teaching learning process but also for running the general administration of the college.

✚ As far as teaching learning is concerned technology has impacted the total process. The college has been able to provide all necessary equipment to the lab based subjects and there are three separate labs for Commerce, Geography and Journalism and Mass Communication. There are plans to equip these labs with many more desktops from the financial grant to be received from UGC. Geography and Journalism and Mass Communication departments also have their own laptops. Apart from these lab based subjects the language departments and some social science departments have been provided with laptops to facilitate teachers in classroom teaching. There is also one LCD projector available to all departments whenever the need arises.

✚ The college office is also pro technology. Admission work and all accounting work are done with the help of computers.

✚ The college website is also revised from time to time and all necessary information is put on the college website.

✚ The college library is in process of being digitized.

✚ The college has been placed under CCTV surveillance to ensure security within college campus.

4.3.6 Examples on learning activities and technologies deployed that place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process:

The transition from the traditional chalk and board system of class lecture is gradually getting replaced by technology aided learning. The comfort level of the traditional system is being challenged by the dynamics of technology and the robustness it offers. The volume of information at finger tips helps not only the teachers but also the students.

The honours students of Journalism and Mass Communication department have 250 marks as their practical paper. They are taught photoshop, editing, page make up, photo editing, web page designing of a newspaper, preparing documentary and preparing advertisement. The general students of this department have 75 marks practical paper and they are taught almost the same things but in concise manner.

The students of Commerce department, honours and general, have Information Technology paper of 100 marks. The honours students have to prepare a project of 100 marks in their third year. In their practical exam they have to make presentation of their paper using computer.

Apart from the use of computers in these labs based subjects the other departments also use technology for effective teaching. The English department has materials of different topics stored in the machine and uses them to teach. Moreover with the help of laptop and pen drive the teacher is able to show students film versions of their texts. Students find this very helpful as this helps them to grab the meaning of the text better. In addition whenever there is need for quick reference the teacher is able to log in to the net and procure it for the students.

The students of History department were shown the televised version of Jawaharlal Nehru's *Discovery of India* titled '**Bharat Ek Khoj**'. The department teacher also downloaded rare maps of 14th and 15th Europe from net. The students also were able to form some idea on Renaissance paintings.

Political Science department showed the students the televised series of Rajya TV's 'Samvidhan –the Making of the Constitution'. Materials are downloaded from the net and given to the students for reference work.

Power point presentations are given to the by the departments of Political Science, Geography, History, Journalism and Mass Communication.

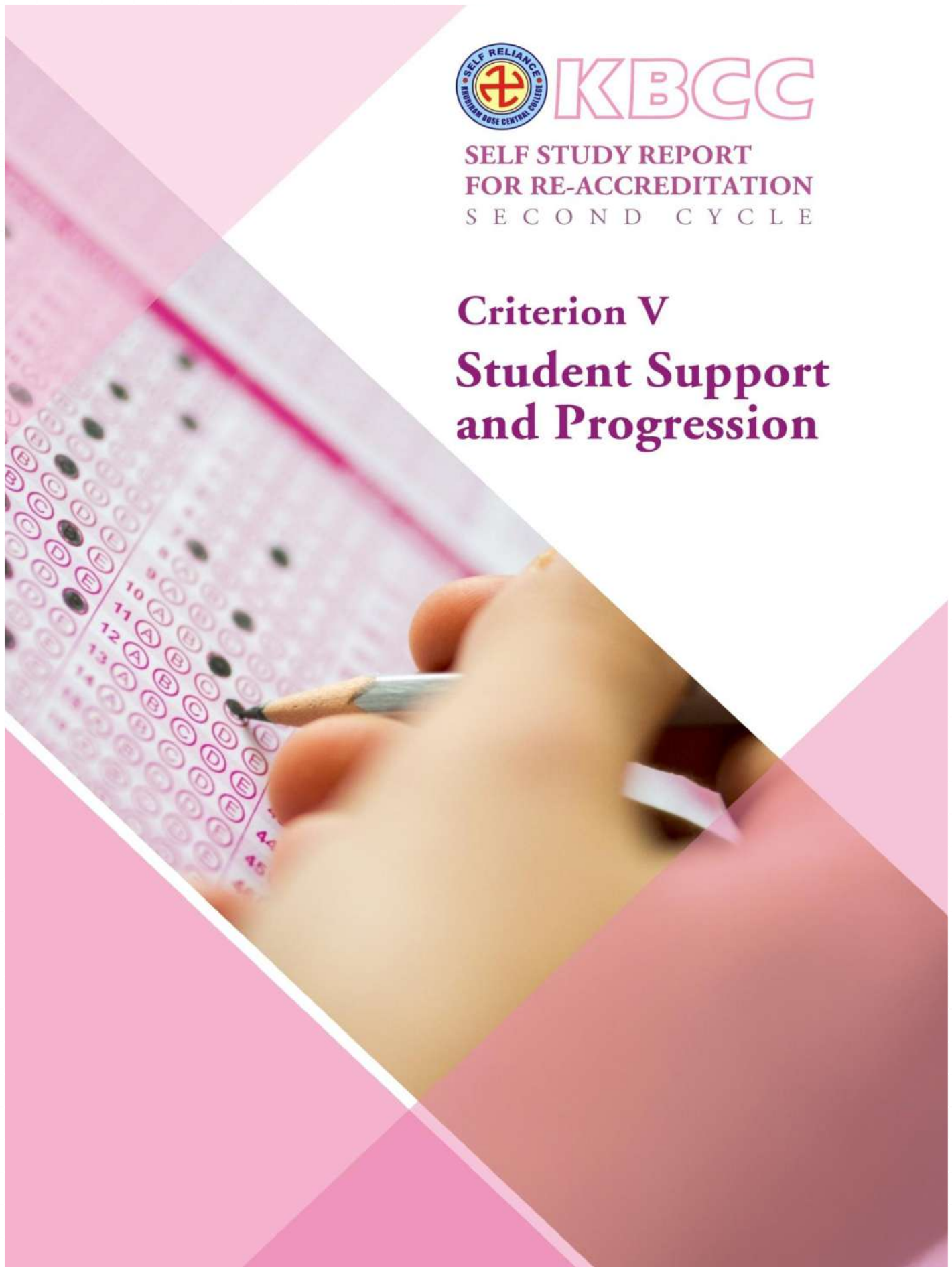

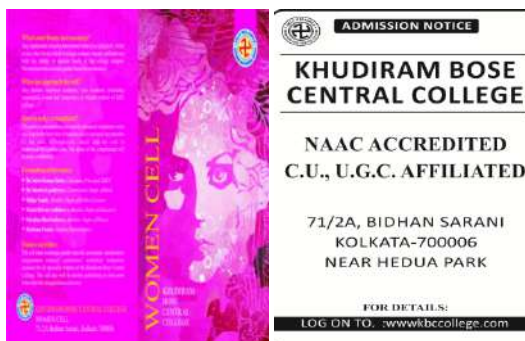
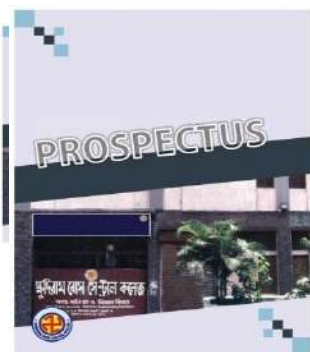

➤ **SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:**

Other than scholarships, Remedial Coaching Classes and Free Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams under Entry into Services Schemes sponsored by UGC under XIth and XIIth Plans are made available for SC/ST students . Under Entry into Services schemes the students were provided study materials and books for reading at free of cost for the students of these categories. Reservation Quotas as per government rules are available in admission of every academic year as SC – 30%/ST - /OBC – category (a) and (b) students.

➤ **Students with physical disabilities**

3 % Reservation quota of every quota is available for students of these categories as per government rules. Besides the college also provides every possible assistance like audio record of class lectures provided by faculties, extra classes only with the students of these categories within the college.

A special relaxation of norms in marks criteria has been available in admission to students who participate at minimum District/State/National and International Sports Competition. Also relaxation of norms in attendance and internal exam appearance has been available to these category of students. There is a committee who reviews and considers these issues.

➤ **Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.**

Khudiram Bose Central College is an institutional member of Students' Health Home. The college makes arrangement for the students to avail themselves of modern and free treatment facilities in the students' health home at heavily subsidized rate. The nearest centre is S.A. Jaipuria College. The students get medical advice in different fields --- Eye, dental, ENT, Skin, Orthopaedics, Neurology, Cardiology, Psychiatry, Gynaecology, Medicine and Surgery. The Health Home is open from 4.00 p.m. to 6.00 p.m. Monday to Friday and from 3.00 p.m. to 5.00 p.m. on Saturday. The college along with students' union body on 01.12.15 arranged a health check up, blood donation camps and health awareness programmes for the students and staffs of the college.

➤ **Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams**

The college has received grants from UGC under XIth and XIIth Plan under Entry into Services Scheme and Career Counseling Scheme for organizing free coaching classes for different competitive exams. The college successfully arranges six month certificate courses for the students under this scheme preparing for different competitive exams organized by the Entry into Services Cell like Rail/Bank/PSC/SSC/Combined Services like. The cell arranged classes thrice a week and classes were held for two hours and were taken by renowned resource persons like directors, faculties of different career guiding academic institutes within the state, WBCS (Exe), and like. At the end, the students were provided with certificates. **Around two hundred students were enrolled for these classes. Amongst them, around fifteen students were participants of outside colleges and universities.** Similarly, the Career Counseling Cell of the college arranges counseling sessions with experts, resource persons and arranges workshops for the students. To exemplify, Five Days workshop were arranged by this Career Cell of the college on CDS-NDA Exam, (defence oriented) **where around twenty students participated,** Interview Skills, Communication and Grooming workshop was conducted by ICFAI University etc where almost **one hundred and seventy students participated..** For Commerce students of the college, a session was organized with ICWAI.

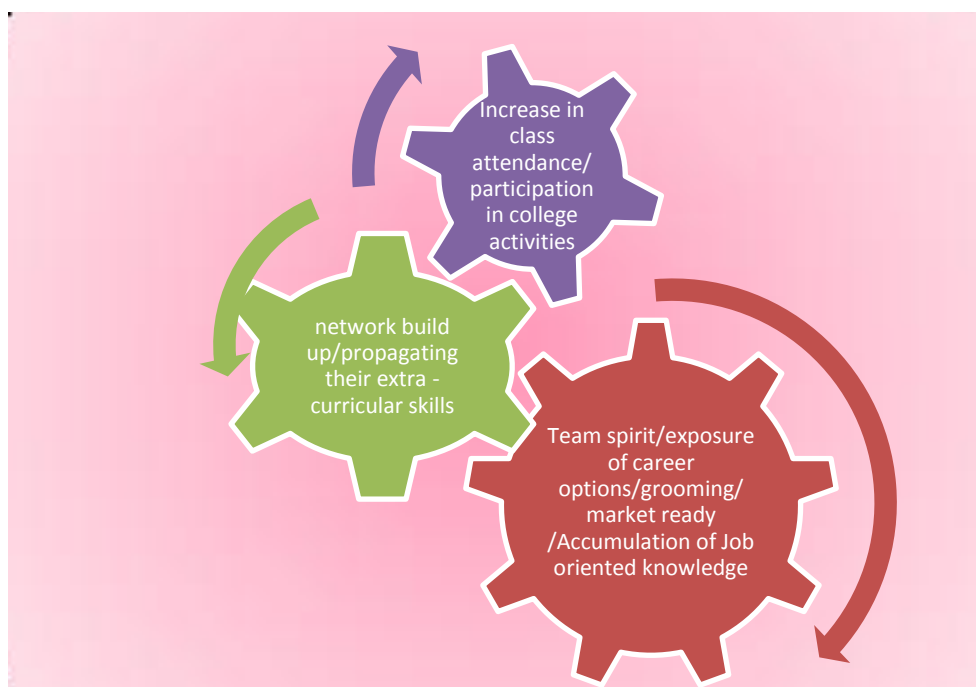

The college facilitates student progression to higher level of education and towards employment through regular motivation and counseling by faculty members of the departments and other senior members of the college. The college authority is also keen in ensuring that all the information are being uploaded in the college website. In addition the Career Counseling Cell, Placement Cell and Entry into Services Cell of the college in every academic year actively and regularly organizes

- Interactive session and lectures
- Training programmes and workshops
- Grooming Session
- Career fair with the help of academic experts from both in and out of the institution.
- Campus interviews with reputed companies
- Awareness Programmes
- Free coaching classes for competitive exams for both in and out students of the college
- Motivates participation in inter and intra cultural, literary and youth level competition in and outside of the college

- Encourages field visit study for the students apart from making classroom teaching for their better performance
- Adopted different modes of modern and interesting methods of teaching (elaborately explained in the prospectus of the college): Audio – visual presentation, dramatized way of teaching, film screening, and like.
- Few departments of the college has started student seminar presentation on a topic related to their syllabus. The first initiative was taken by Department of History.
- College also always trying to build network, collaboration with institutes of repute for students progression like Ramkrishna Mission, Different Universities, Reputed Academic Career Guiding institutes, Companies etc.
- The Career Counseling and Placement Cell also published a career report where all the activities of this cell have been recorded.

A proposal has been set up by the college to start its PG courses in two departments of the college, namely, Journalism and Mass Communication and Geography.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The Governing Body of the college specially is very strict in matter of student's attendance and also concerned with the overall performance of the students. For this, the college authority has already prescribed the following recommendations to all the departments in every academic year:

- **Vigilance:** The faculty within each department is highly involved and vigilant. They regularly monitor performance and when a student's performance is not up to the mark, the student is provided with extra guidance.
- **Academic Council Meeting:** The college has an academic council body which meets with all the departmental heads and other faculties in order to take the reports regarding attendance record, class tests and overall performance of the students of the departments and takes decisions regarding the dropouts and students who are at risk of failure. *The Principal of the college is the chairman of this body.*
- **PTA:** Parent Teachers - Principal Annual meetings are conducted by most departments to inform the parents about their wards progress so that they maintain the standard and refrain from dropping out of the education system.
- **Special Guidance and Classes:** For the slow learners or students who are at risk of failure, the department teachers as and when required takes special classes and exams and suggest every possible way of improvement by counseling and meeting with their parents
- **Remedial Coaching Classes:** Remedial Coaching Classes are also being conducted by all the departments which are sponsored by UGC.
- **Attendance Record:** All the departments also publish students' attendance record before major exams and monthly the faculty of each department also alerts the students who are having poor attendance and in spite of all these measures adopted, if any students fails to attend the classes as per university norms, that student is debarred from appearing university exams.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

Vision of the college

- The college wants to infuse into the students the value of self reliance, thereby building a self reliant society.



Mission of the college

- Self reliance at two levels – making college self reliant and making students self reliant.
- Objectives

• Making college self reliant –

- ✓ Without financial independence an institution cannot achieve its target. This college seeks to attain financial stability so that it can provide better service to the students.
- ✓ The college is dependent on West Bengal College Service Commission for appointment of teachers. This is a long drawn process and there is a big time gap in between the application made by college to WBCSC to fill up its vacant post and the actual appointment of teachers. Management ensures that students do not suffer from non availability of teachers. Guest teachers are appointed by the college and paid by the college on the basis of classes taken by them.
- ✓ The vision of self reliance engulfs many aspects – responsibility, innovations, devotion, dedication, leadership. In all the Management believes in promoting a healthy work culture encapsulating all these qualities.

• Making students self reliant

- ✓ The college aims at making the students self reliant. This comes with making the students responsible. A student can be made responsible primarily in three aspects – financial, social and moral.
- ✓ Financial responsibility comes with good education. A student is made aware that if s/he can get good marks then he can hope to have a good career. To give students the benefit of

facing the job market the college has *Career Counseling and Entry into Services Cell*. This Cell arranges different classes related to the job market. Along with this Cell the college runs a *Placement Cell* that organizes interviews for students with different companies. In the recent past companies like Wipro, Zed Ca, Shree Automotive Pvt. Ltd, Techmatrix. Merit Track and like.

- ✓ Students must be made socially responsible. Only then can they become good nation builders. The college has two wings the NCC and NSS that help students realize the importance of service to society. National Cadet Corps makes students realize service for country. The NSS, National Service scheme under the Ministry of Human Resources was started with the fundamental objective of community service.

The college management operates on two basic principles – collective leadership and participative management.

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The college follows a policy of centralized planning and decentralized work. The top level of management, the Governing Body, of the college frames policies. These are then executed through the Principal of the college along with the faculty members and office staff. As the General Secretary of the Students' Union of the college is also part of college administration s/he is also a wing of this decentralized work.

In order to ensure that the Principal of the college can function effectively there are many Committees which are part of the Governing Body of the college. These Committees are

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- **the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission**

The college is committed to the vision of self reliance. This is manifested in the policies adopted by top level management in making the college and thereby the students self reliant. All policies framed in this regard are percolated to the different layers of administration in the college, namely Principal, faculty, non teaching staff and Students. This democratic leadership serves as an effective tool in our vision of self reliance.

- **formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan**

Certain plans and programmes are formulated right at the top level of management, Governing Body of the college. However Teachers' Council meetings are conducted at regular intervals and any resolutions related to academic or administrative issues are forwarded to the Governing Body for approval. Again problems discussed in departmental meetings are referred to Academic Committee and if necessary then to Governing Body. All strategic plans finally get Governing Body's approval and are executed through the various layers of administration.

- **Interaction with stakeholders**

Our students are our primary stakeholders. From 2013 onwards the IQAC started taking feedback from the students in the form of *Evaluation of college by Students*.

Principal of the college visits different departments from time to time and interacts with the students.

The college arranges Parents – Teachers' Meet every year.

The college Alumni started functioning 9th April 2012. The college is now in the process of registering this body under West Bengal Societies Act 1961

- **Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders**

The Principal visits the departments from time to time. He notes down their problems and these are taken up at departmental meetings.

Parents – teachers' Meet is arranged every year. These meets are very useful as *Principal* directly interacts with the parents and guardians and again their suggestions are noted down. These suggestions are discussed at different forums like Teachers' Council, Academic Committee and Governing Body. The ex – students of the college in the alumni programme, *Punarnava* offered suggestions in improving the college.

- **Reinforcing the culture of excellence**

Reinforcing culture of excellence is part of sustained development. The focus on promoting excellence has always been of prime importance. In every aspect, be it academic or administrative the college always tries to ensure that development always takes place. In fact the college has always championed that holistic development is part of college curriculum. In all our new initiatives this reinforcing gets highlighted.

- **Champion organizational change**

Any change that will lead to the growth and development of the college is always appreciated by the Governing Body of the college. In fact innovations in both academic and administrative spheres form a part of discussion in meetings of Governing Body.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college follows a policy of democratic decentralization. While some policies are dictated from top level management there are also some policies which are referred to the management from the bottom level for final approval.

Majority of decisions concerning administration comes from Governing Body. This is circulated among the staff of the college through the Teacher Representatives in Governing Body, Non – teaching Representative in Governing Body and also Student’ Representative in Governing Body.

Teachers’ Council Meetings are periodically held where academic issues and issues related to teacher benefits are discussed. Resolutions adopted in these meetings are forwarded to the Governing Body or Academic Committee for their approval.

Departmental meetings with Principal are also useful to monitor and evaluate departmental growth. Problems encountered in functioning of departments are dealt with in these meetings. If there are problems that require top level involvement then they are included in Governing Body or Academic Committee meetings.

Not only does Principal organize departmental meetings he also sits with the office staff for resolving administrative issues. He holds discussions with Head Clerk, Accountant, Cashier, Electrician and also other administrative staff. Any problem related to Group D staff of the college is generally handled by the Head Clerk. These problems escalate to Principal only if the Head Clerk is unable to come to an acceptable conclusion.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Governing Body of the college is quite concerned about the holistic development of the faculty members. While the members of Governing Body believe that every faculty should aim at his / her academic betterment the members also hold strong the belief that teachers should also be an integral part of administration.

Teachers are encouraged to attend Refresher Courses, Orientation programmes, as framed by UGC, from time to time. They are also asked to organize seminars with financial grant from UGC or from any other organization, hold departmental seminars, extension lectures, educational tours etc.

Management welcomes innovative teaching techniques from the Teachers and is totally committed in providing infrastructural support to them.

The Governing Body expects academic leadership from the faculty members. It is expected that teachers will define strategies to run their respective departments. They are to make their academic calendars at the beginning of each academic year, prepare an evaluation calendar in consultation with other teachers, inform Principal about the functioning of department, have total involvement in the development of students of the department, initiate measures if any student does not conform to rules and ensure that syllabus gets completed as stated in academic calendar. The departmental heads perform additional functions. In case there is shortage of teaching staff in any department the HOD, in consultation with Principal, sees guest teachers are timely appointed. They see that junior teachers of their department are working towards their academic orientation.

Teachers are not only coordinators / in – charge of different committees and cells but they are also members of other committees and cells. It has already been explained in 6.1.5 that teachers are expected to show leadership at their departmental levels.

Not only the teaching faculty but the non – teaching members of the college are also members of the above mentioned Committees and Cells. The office staffs are:

Not only is leadership expected from the teaching and non – teaching staff of the college, it is also expected from the students. The Students' Union of the college has representatives of each class, First year, Second year and third year B.A. B.Sc. and B.Com both Honours and

General. The students who get elected do exhibit leadership quality. These representatives serve the rest of the students in the college and are also included as members of different committees and cells. The General Secretary of the Students' Union is a member of the Governing Body and an invited member of Admission Committee. The Sports Secretary is a member of the Sports Committee. There is also a student representative in the Magazine Committee which is part of Publication Committee. Student representative is member of Women Cell. Moreover these representatives take upon themselves the responsibility of organizing annual picnic, annual social, Saraswati Puja, Independence Day and Republic Day. The Students' Union also arranges 'blood donation camps', health check up camps.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority, provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The faculty, office and students forms the different units of the college. A system of decentralization of work is prevalent in our college. The Governing Body gives authority to the Principal to execute all decisions made by it. At the same time the departments are given autonomy to ensure their effective functioning. The structure of governance followed in this college is in the shape of a pyramid. At the bottom level we have the Students' Union, Faculty members and the college office. These function at multiple levels through committees and cells and report to the principal. At the top we have the Governing Body. At times policies percolate to the bottom level and there are instances when issues are discussed at the third tier and are sent to the top level for approval. It is a two way process.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes the college does promote a culture of participative management. All the levels of the college - the students, the faculty, Principal and Governing Body take part in the management of the college.

The students have their representatives in the Students' Union. This Union conducts meetings and communicates their viewpoints to the principal. The General Secretary of the Students' Union is also a member of Governing Body and various committees.

The different departments have departmental meetings and again issues are either referred directly to the Governing Body or to the Academic Committee. Participative management is also felt in the functioning of the departments. Not only do the full time teachers occupy themselves with the welfare of their students but equal participation is encouraged from the Part Time Teachers and Guest Teachers.

The Statute of Calcutta University ensures that participative management forms the *modus operandi* of the Governing Body of all affiliated colleges in West Bengal. The composition of the Governing Body is reflects this. Apart from Principal, Teacher Representatives, Non-Teaching Representatives and Student Representative there are two University Nominees and two Government Nominees who are members of the Governing Body. The Councilor is another member of this body.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes the college has a formally stated quality policy. This quality policy is in keeping with our vision of self reliance. All our objectives are channelized to meet this vision. Our general objectives as well as academic objectives are clearly stated in the college prospectus given to the students during the time of admission. An inauguration ceremony takes place every year before the commencement of new academic session. Principal of the college in his inauguration speech presents in summarized version the fundamental objectives of the college. In our annual Parents – teachers' Meet once again these parameters of vision are stated for the benefit of parents / guardians. All our objectives concerned with teaching and general functioning of the college are reviewed in different meetings – departmental, teachers' council, Governing Body.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The college definitely has plans for development. These plans can be categorized as 'long term plans' and 'short term plans'.

Long term plans

- ➔ **Acquire college building** - this college was revived in 1956 by *Sri Kiran Coomar Bose, elder son of our founding father Principal Khudiram Bose*. A Trust was set up to look after the affairs of the college. However in 2008 members of his family, *Sri Santanu Bose and Sri Kausik Bose* gave a declaration that as they cannot look after the Trust they would like to hand over the building to the college for purpose of education. They also made an application to Government of West Bengal to transfer the building in the name of college. This is a long term process and the college is yet to acquire this building.
- ➔ **Academic expansion** – the college would like to introduce new subjects both in arts and science streams. Subjects like computer science, psychology, sociology are being considered. As there is shortage of space including these subjects in our curriculum remain our long term plan.
- ➔ **Gymnasium** – sports is an area of major concern for the college. Though the college is able to provide basic infrastructure support related to sports the college does not have a gymnasium to help the students.

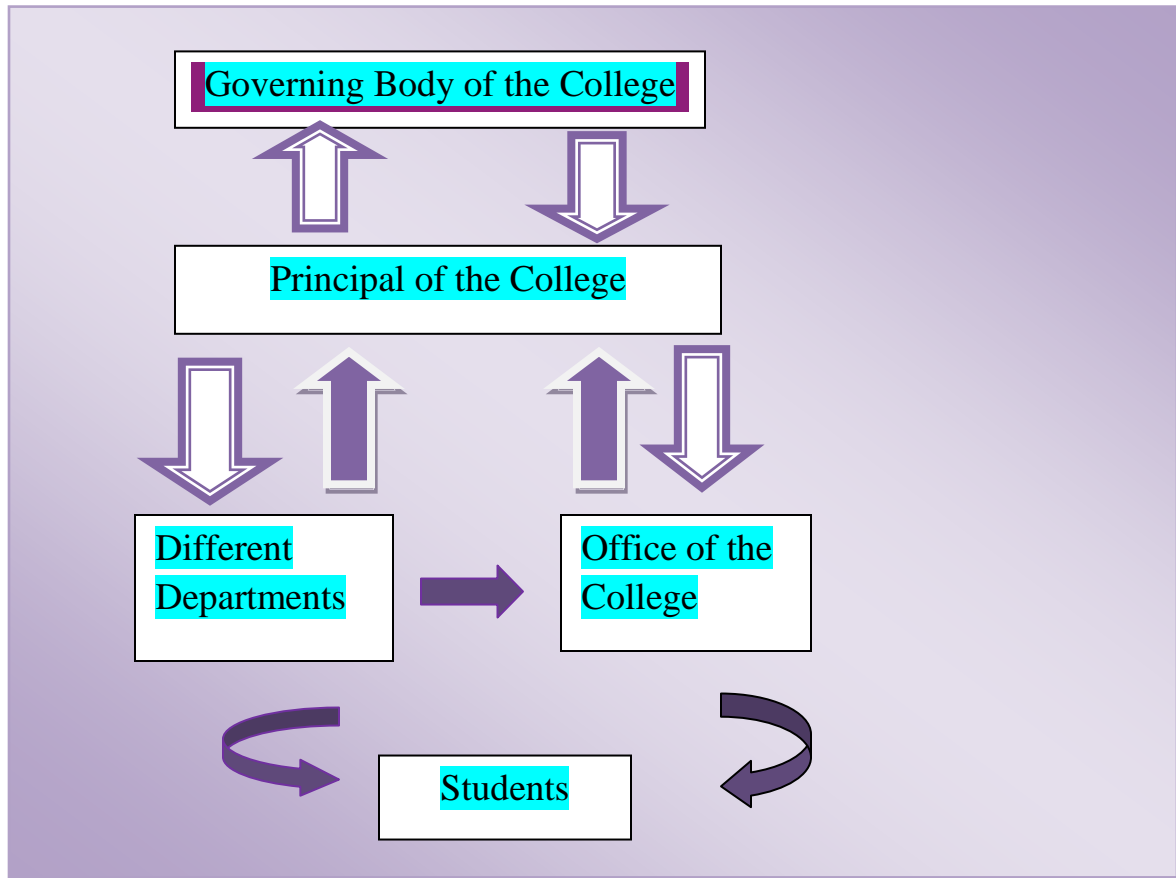
Short term plans (next academic session)

- ➔ **College Auditorium** – the college is engaged in repair and renovation of the building. An auditorium has been newly constructed and decoration is going on.
- ➔ **Technology aided teaching** – the college has been able to provide equipment required by laboratory based subjects like Geography, Commerce and Journalism and Mass Communication. Some of the non – lab based subjects have also been provided with laptops to facilitate teaching. However not all the departments in the college have this opportunity. The financial support received from UGC helps in providing such support.

- ➔ **Departmental library** – some of the departments have their own departmental library like Political Science. The college would like to see such libraries in all the departments of the college. Each department has been provided with its own almirahs so that the departments can start their own departmental libraries.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Policies at times percolate from top order to the bottom and at times decisions are sent from the bottom order to the top level for approval.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

- **Teaching & Learning**

The atmosphere of the college is conducive for growth of teaching and learning. The Governing Body also encourages this growth. The departments of the college are given total freedom to explore initiatives and management makes sincere effort to support such initiatives.

To make teaching and learning purposeful the departments plan departmental seminars, extension lectures, project works. The English department conducted Spoken English classes for the students. Due to shortage of departmental teachers this class could not be conducted for last two sessions but there are plans to begin these classes from the next session.

- **Research & Development**

To develop the academic area of a teacher s/he is allowed to join *Refresher Courses and Orientation programmes, Short Term Courses* conducted by different Universities. Teachers are also given the scope to participate in seminars, workshops both as speakers and resource persons. Teachers also conduct seminars in their own departments either with financial help from UGC or from college.

Teachers are also encouraged to improve their academic qualification. Many of our teachers have completed their M.Phil or Ph.D courses after joining this college.

It needs to be added that not only are teachers encouraged to pursue higher studies even non – teaching staff are encouraged to do so. The Library clerk of the College, *Sri Sujit Deb completed his completed his B.Lib.Sc from Rabindra Bharati University in the year 2006 and M.Lib.Sc in the year 2014 from Netaji Open University.*

- **Community Engagement**

The NSS wing of the college is engaged in doing community service. Apart from the work done by NSS the Students' Union organizes blood donation camps, health check up camps.

- **Human resource management**

The college does not have a stated HR policy but follows the HR policy as mentioned in Calcutta University Statute and also policy declared by West Bengal Government. However human resource management is based more on tapping the expertise of teachers and non – teaching staff of the college for the benefit of the institution. Teachers not only perform in their academic area but they also have skills in other areas which the college tries to utilize.

- **Industry Interaction**

The final year students honours students of the department of commerce is expected to submit a project for which they have to interact with industry. For the benefit of all the students of the college the Career Counseling Cell and Placement Cell arrange interviews with different

companies. Many organizations also give presentation of courses related to the job market. The college arranged Career Fair where different companies put up stalls in the college and interacted with the students. Students from other colleges were also invited.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information(from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The college collects feedback from the students of outgoing year. This evaluation form encapsulates all the areas of the college – teachers, non – teaching staff, library, infrastructure provided, support mechanism. This evaluation report is place in meeting of Governing Body.

Principal visits departments and collects feedback on teachers' performance in class. Not only does he enquire about the quality of teaching imparted he also makes it a point to ask whether students get timely help and support from their respective teachers. He makes a note of all the problems faced by the students and these are taken up in department's meeting with the Principal.

Teachers maintain their departmental academic record book. Each teacher keeps information on topics taught. This is a daily record book. Principal checks this record book and sees if parity is maintained between what is written in academic calendar and what is noted in academic record book.

Every year the college arranges Parents – teachers' Meet. In these meets direct interaction takes place between parents and Principal. Parents come up with certain suggestions and these are recorded and college tries to incorporate these suggestions if possible.

Meetings of Teachers' Council also are effective in the development of the college. Resolutions of all academic discussions are forwarded to the Governing Body for approval.

All these steps help Principal and management of the college to keep track of teaching learning that takes place in college.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

An institution can progress only if there is inter – dependence among management and staff. This college works on this principle. Teachers, non – teaching staff and students are not only part of administration by virtue of being members of Governing Body but these sections of the college are also involved in different committees and cells that exist in the college. Therefore a teacher or a non – teaching member is not only operational in his or her area of work for which s/he got appointment but is also an integral part of development of college.

As stated earlier the representatives of Students' Union also takes upon themselves the responsibility of development of the college.

The Evaluation of College by Third Year Students also is very effective. Based on the feedback given by the students of college changes its strategies and this helps to promote better relationship between college and stakeholders.

Yes, the college has a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance.

For the last three years the IQAC of the college is conducting Evaluation of College by Students. The final year,i.e. the third year students of the college make an evaluation of the college. They rate the infrastructure, office staff, library, their respective teachers, the facilities provided to them, college administration, Students’Union. This holistic evaluation gives the college an idea what we still need to do to serve our primary stakeholders better.

All the members of the college welcomed this evaluation and even accepted the ratings given to them. We became aware of the areas where we had to improve. Service is like an ever widening horizon and there is nothing called perfect service. Needs and requirements are always changing. So, all our efforts are routed in making continuous changes according to the needs of our students and ensuring development for the betterment of the college.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The college makes arrangements for teachers to go for Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, Summer Schools, to attend seminars and workshops, both as and paper presenters and resource persons.

The college also sees that departmental seminars, extension lectures are arranged both for the benefit of the students and teachers.

Teachers not only participate in programmes related to their academic area but are also encouraged to attend seminars and workshops related to their extended activities. For example the teacher involved in NSS is asked to attend any training given in this respect. The teacher in charge of IQAC attends workshops on IQAC.

Not only are teachers encouraged to enhance their professional development the non – teaching staff of the also take trainings from time to time. In the recent past the following non – teaching staff undertook trainings -

- Sri Gora Chand Banduri attended a training given by Calcutta University.
- Sri Sanjoy Ganguly and Sri Gora Chand Banduri got trained by Cybersoftec.com in 2011 when the college computerized the admission process.
- Cybersoftec.com also trained the library staff when they installed a specially designed a library software.
- SB Creation gave the office staff, especially Sri Gopal Mukherjee and Sri Sanjoy Ganguly training on how to handle ‘on line admission’ in 2015.
- COSA (Computerization of Salary Account) training given to Sri Gora Chand Banduri

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The Governing Body of the college encourages teachers to participate in RC / OP /Seminars / Workshops and any other training beneficial for the well being of the college. However the management is very clear on the issue that whenever a teacher enrolls himself / herself in any such programme the respective teacher is to see that departmental classes are not hampered. Alternative arrangement needs to be made and information must go to the students.

Another strategy adopted by the management of this college is that training related to technical issues are not only given to the office staff but some of the teacher members are also involved in it. For example the training on COSA was also given to *Prof Anamika Nandy and to Prof. Sheuli Biswas (Adhikary)*.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Each department has its own Academic Record Book. Teachers maintain their academic performance in this book.

Principal visits the departments from time to time. He takes feedback from the students about the quality of teaching, syllabus completion, teacher's involvement in students' academic growth, etc. All these are discussed in departmental meetings.

Parents – teachers' Meet is another medium to get feedback from our stakeholders, parents / guardians. Suggestions received are recorded in detail and taken up at different levels of meetings.

The IQAC of the college conducts an evaluation of college done by third year students of the college. The report is placed in meetings of IQAC and Governing Body. An analysis is made on the basis of report prepared by IQAC. As this evaluation encompasses all sectors of the institution the college is able to get a total performance appraisal.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The outcome of such reviews is that the college is able to identify areas which need immediate focus. Strategies to improve are discussed at different levels – Governing Body, Teachers' Council, Departmental meetings, meetings between Principal and office staff. Any change initiated is communicated to the students through 'college notice board' and 'students' notice book.'

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The different Welfare Schemes in the college are –

- ✓ Provident Scheme - as per rule of Government of West Bengal every substantive employee has to make Provident Fund contribution. 100% of employees benefit from contribution to PF. If needed an employee can take loans from Provident Fund. In last five years 8 non – teaching staff have taken loan from PF and 4 teachers (including Principal) have taken loan from PF.
- ✓ Group Insurance – 100% of teaching and non – teaching staff benefit from this scheme during the time of their superannuation.
- ✓ Festival Advance – the college has a welfare scheme called 'festival advance'. Full time employees of the college and Government approved Part Time Teachers can avail this facility. Those who want to take festival advance submit a written application just before Durga Puja. As per resolution of Governing Body Rs. 12000/- is given as advance to the applicants. All the full time non – teaching staff take this advance and about 25% of teachers benefit from this.
- ✓ Staff Entertainment - there is a system of allocating a percentage of college funds for the purpose of staff entertainment. This system started in 2014. All the staff of the college enjoy an outing.

- ✓ Scheme for casual staff – at present the college has three casual staff – two in Group D category and one in Group C category. Every year just before Durga Puja the college gives festival bonus to these three casual staff.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

As the salary of the teaching staff is paid by Government there is no scope for giving financial incentive. However college supports academic expansion of the teachers and supports them in all their endeavours by providing both freedom to work and infrastructural support. The atmosphere of our college is conducive to academic growth.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college has the following mechanism to efficiently use its financial resources –

- Preparation of annual budget
- Monitoring of income and expenditure through an Internal Audit System
- Regular check up of the same by Finance Committee of the college followed by placing of the same in meeting of Governing Body.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The college conducts both internal and external audit.

- Internal Audit – an internal auditor is appointed by the Governing Body of the college who, from time to time, submits his report to the Principal and the same is placed before the GB by him.
- External Auditor – an external auditor is appointed by the Government who submits his report annually. Last audit was done for the year 2013-14 and no major audit objections have been found.
- CAG Audit Report - A team from The Comptroller and Auditor General of India visited college on 15-16th February 2012.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of income of college are as follows –

- Students Fees
- State Government Grant

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college has received grants from M.P. LAD. Grants received have been utilized for the purpose for which they were received.

- A grant of Rs 75000/- was received from Sri Md. Salim in the year 2005.
- A grant of Rs 5,00,000/- was received from Hon'ble Minister Sri Sudip Bandopadhyaya for the purpose of building development. This grant did not directly come to college. It was utilized through Calcutta Corporation.
- The college also tries to generate resources by providing space to conduct different exams on Sundays.
- The College also received grants from Ministry of Consumer Affairs, West Bengal MLA, Hon'ble Minister Sri Sadhan Pandey to hold awareness campaigns related on consumer rights and acts.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

- a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If yes, what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

The college has an Internal Quality assurance Cell. This Cell was formed after NAAC Peer Team visit in February 2007. In keeping with the vision and mission of the college the IQAC also tries to follow the objectives envisaged by the college.

- b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

Since its formation in 2007 the Cell has tried to improve the quality of service to the stakeholders. For this purpose it took certain decisions like –

- Initiating a system of evaluation by the students of the institution
- Ensuring quality input of students during admission to get better result
- Opening of different committees or cells to facilitate academic and administrative work
- Computerization of college office and library
- Promotional benefit of teachers
- Shifting the Teachers' Room to a bigger location.
- Providing infrastructure support to the departments like almirahs, laptops, books, projector.

The Cell communicated to the Principal about the decisions taken by the members at different meetings. Most of the above mentioned points have been implemented but as space remains our major constraint shifting the staff room to another location within the college campus has not been possible. Being too much strict about marks during admission still remains a distant possibility as the college still cannot compromise student intake.

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

The IQAC has external members. They are members of our Governing Body and local Councillor. As they are very busy they cannot attend our meetings but they are very supportive of the work the Cell does.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

Our Alumni Committee is now in the process of getting registered under West Bengal Societies Act, 1963. After the process gets completed the alumni will play a more fundamental role in the development of the college. However, when they come for any programme they do enrich the college with their suggestions which the Cell keeps in mind in its meetings. The General Secretary of the college is member of Cell and attends meetings.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC of the college has as its members the principal of the college, teaching and non teaching staff, library staff, external Governing Body members and students' representative. The coordinator of the Cell communicates to the other members about meetings.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The vision which the college upholds is clearly translated into both its academic and administrative areas. Quality is maintained both in the academic performance of the departments and also in the general administration of the college. As we are still in our developing phase the college is continuously revising its stated objectives in keeping with the requirements of the time.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If ‘yes’, give details enumerating its impact.

Trainings to the staff of the college is twofold - academic trainings like Refresher Courses, Orientation Programmes, Summer Schools, seminars, workshops, extension lectures. Administrative trainings include participating in trainings required for running different committees and cells existing in the college.

It needs to be pointed out that the college follows a system of participative management. In this system the teaching faculties apart from their regular academic trainings are also given trainings related to administrative issues. Teachers took trainings on running the admission software, on line admission process, COSA.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If ‘yes’, how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The college has not undertaken Academic Audit in the recent past. However in 2003 an Academic Audit was done in college by Calcutta University.

However the college has its own internal academic audit practice. Every department maintains its own academic record book which is in compliance with the academic calendar distributed at the beginning of the academic year. The departmental heads ensure that the teaching faculties of their department keep a detailed record of the topics taught in the class. Principal checks this record book from time to time. Moreover the Principal visits the departments and gathers feedback about the quality of teaching, syllabus completion and service rendered by the faculties to their students.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell was formed following the guidelines of NAAC. This Cell, in its functioning, adheres to the objectives stated by NAAC.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The following mechanisms are practiced by the college to ensure teaching learning outcome.

- Academic record book is maintained by each department and entries are regularly made in it by respective departmental teachers. Principal of the college checks this departmental record book.
- Departmental visit by Principal. He categorically lists grievances, if any, of the students and all these are discussed in departmental meetings.
- Annual parents – teachers’ meet is also a system of checking the teaching learning process. Parents / guardians interact freely with Principal and their suggestions are incorporated.

- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell conducts an annual Evaluation of College by the students of third year. This evaluation covers all the core areas of the college – teaching learning, college office, college library, college administration, infrastructure, Students’ Union, facilities, and extension activities in the college. The report prepared by this Cell is placed before the Governing Body of the college and actions are initiated on the basis of the report.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The quality assurance policies are communicated to the students in the following ways –

- The prospectus distributed to the students at the beginning of the academic session contains the objectives of the college.
- Principal’s address in the inaugural session at the beginning of every academic session. In his address he once again reiterates the quality policies of the college.
- In our parents – teachers’ meet the Principal interacts with the guardians and these meets are very fruitful.
- Relevant notices/circulars are displayed on the college notice boards, websites.

Any other relevant information regarding Governance Leadership and Management which the college would like to include.

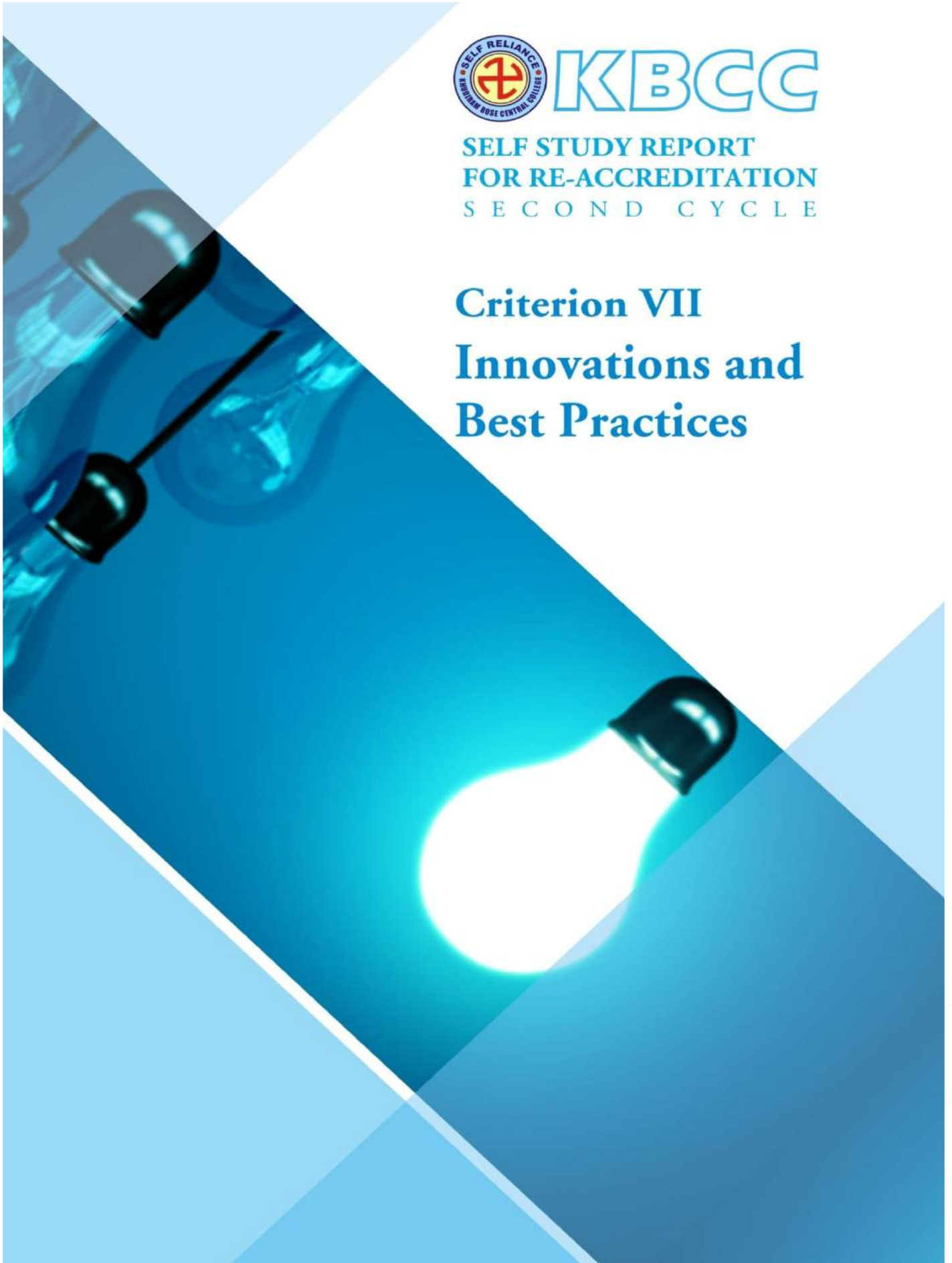

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The college has not conducted a Green Audit formally but measures have been taken to make the college campus eco friendly.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco friendly?

Khudiram Bose Central College is located on Bidhan Sarani. This road happens to be an important connector to local railway station and metro station. The traffic on this road is always very dense. This serves both as an advantage and a disadvantage. As this road connects to railway stations students find it convenient to avail this mode of transport. Apart from railway there are multiple numbers of buses running on this street that connects different places of the city and even the suburbs. However due to this very reason this road remains congested all the time and pollution is a severe concern for us. The college campus at present cannot boast of a garden or open space as space remains our one nagging problem. In such a scenario the college is seriously confronted with the challenge of making this campus eco friendly. Some steps have been initiated in this regard.

- The college has been made no smoking zone
- Chewing and spitting of items like gutkha have been banned and if anyone is found doing so is reprimanded
- Spilling of garbage here and there is not allowed and for this purpose dustbins have been placed at strategic locations.

The college has plans to make the campus green. After the renovation and repair of the building there are plans to plant trees and the NSS wing of the college will work in this respect. In fact at present we can take some pride to say that a very small area has been acquired right in front of the college and trees have been planted there. It is well maintained. Besides adjacent to the staff room a small space has been identified and effort is being made to transform it into a terrace garden. There are serious considerations to include green within the college campus.

Though we do not have things like water harvesting, use of renewable energy, check dam construction, hazardous waste management, e-waste management, we do practice **waste paper management**. Old newspapers, old answer scripts and other papers not required are disposed off at regular intervals. Though it is too early to commit the college may plan solar energy as the rooftop is quite big.

Environment consciousness is now mandatory part of third year syllabus. The idea in making environment study a component of final year syllabus is to inculcate in the students awareness about their environment and the consequences of mishandling the environment.

Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The college is continuously trying to find methods to improve it. As self reliance is our motto we are always in search of techniques to imbibe into the students how to be self reliant. Self reliance is both academic as well as administrative. In the academic sphere certain steps have been implemented

Academic innovations

- Each department has its own **academic calendar** distributed to the students at the beginning of their session
- Apart from specified Calcutta University exams each department frames its own **evaluation pattern**. The departments follow a system of continuous and comprehensive evaluation so that the teachers are able to monitor the progress of the student. Unit tests are conducted on a regular basis.
- The Career Counseling and Placement Cell arranges Career Fair -- *Udaan* for students to become acquainted with the best institutes they can avail after their undergraduate studies or while pursuing their undergraduate studies.
- In the recent past some departments have started organizing **departmental extension lectures**. A subject expert is invited to give a talk on a topic from the syllabus to the departmental students. Such lectures took place in the departments of Political Science, Commerce, English, Bengali AND Journalism and Mass communication.
- Departments also organize **workshops** for their students. The department of Journalism and Mass Communication conducted two workshops titled “Edit the Piece” and “Reporting”. The former was done by Sri Joyjeet Ghosh of The Telegraph and the latter was by Sri Soumen Dutta of Hindustan Times. This department also has its own video library. Students enjoy the luxury of watching reputed films and discussions are held after that. In fact this department is bestowed with the responsibility of video recording any event that takes place in college. It is needless to say that the students of this department do a very good job. This department has included in its academic calendar “**Departmental Day**”. This is really unique in the sense that on this day the students of all the three years meet and the day is spent in fun and laughter. This gives the students strength to work. The junior students also take guidance from their seniors relating to preparation for exam. The Day is observed every year on the last day before puja vacation. On this day this department normally publishes its wall magazine. This rapport between the students of all the three years is noticed in the farewell arranged by the first and second year students for the outgoing third year students.



- Different departments arrange seminars where the students are asked to make **paper presentations**. This is done with the idea to motivate the students to do research work. Education, History, Hindi Departments have been successful in this regard.



- Every year on 31st July Hindi Department organizes **Munshi Premchand Jayanti**. An expert is invited to give a talk on any aspect of Premchand's writings. Last year Munshi Premchand's famous short stories, *Buri Kaki* and *Kafan* were enacted by the famous Thespian Uma Jhunjhunwala. This department also observes Hindi Divas on 14th September.



- The Department of Bengali is very conscious about observing **Bhasa Divas** on 21st February each year. This department also arranges programmes on Pacishe Baishak and Baishe Shrabon on occasion of Rabindra Jayanti (to celebrate the birthday of Rabindranath Tagore) and Death anniversary of the poet respectively.



- Most of the departments arrange **education tours** for their students. These tours take place either at places related to a student's academic area or any place which is not directly related to his/her academics but helps to enrich his/her knowledge. The department of English, Political Science, Journalism and Mass Communication took the students to Birla Science Museum. The students enjoyed the various science shows as it was something new to them. The departments of *Political Science, Journalism and Mass Communication. Education and Hindi* visited Bidhan Sabha of the state. Also the department of *Political Science and Education* visited Belur Math. The students of *History* with their faculties visited Indian Museum. The department of *Education* visited Vivekananda's Ancestral Home located on Bidhan Sarani.



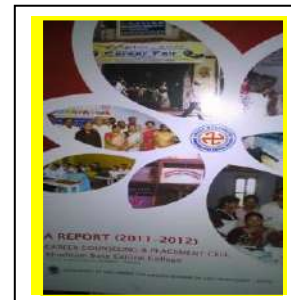
- Each department maintains its own **academic record book**. Every day the teachers of the departments write down the classes taken by them and topics discussed. This record book is very useful as it serves as ready reference for the teachers of the department. At any point of time teachers can see what has been taught by the other teacher/s of that department.



- **Inter departmental classes** form a basic part of each department's routine. Teacher of one subject is asked to take one or two classes of another department, provided that the area to be taught is common to both the departments. Teachers from Hindi and Bengali departments are invited to take classes for third year English honours Students as there are English translations of poems by poets of Hindi and Bengali literatures. The department of Political Science and Journalism also plan to hold such inter departmental classes from the next session.
- English department arranges **cinematic rendition of the texts** which are part of the syllabus. Such visualization helps the students to understand their texts better. The department of Political Science also organizes film show for the students. However this is not just restricted to this department, students of other departments also are invited.
- The department of Hindi adopted a new method of teaching – **dramatized presentation of any piece** from novel or drama specified in the syllabus.
- From 2012 the college started a system of **awarding the meritorious students**. Awards are given under two heads – special awards sponsored by members of the college and general awards funded by college.
- Some of the departments have their own **wall magazines** –
 - Bengali --- *Bangla Bibhagio Patrika*
 - Commerce -- *Saptaparni*
 - Education -- *Educatum*
 - English – *Chokher Aloy – Beyond Vision (Departmental Magazine)*
 - Hindi – *Abhivyakti*(published on occasion of Munshi Premchand Divas and Hindi Divas, observed on 31st July, 14th September respectively).
 - History – *Uttaran*
 - Journalism and Mass Communication – *Diganta*
 - Political Science – *Agradut*
- The college has its own **ISSN NO. 2454 5279**. Academic journal called '*Pragya*' has been published with this number recently. Since the last two years the college stated publishing its annual Newsletter – *KBCC Newsletter*.



- The Career Counselling and Placement Cells of the college also publishes their report.



- The college also has published its activities in a form of photo album *Journey Through Lens*.



- The college organizes the annual Khudiram Bose Memorial Lecture to commemorate the death anniversary of our founder Principal Khudiram Bose. This lecture is held every year on 15th December. This lecture started 2011 onwards. Till date the following lectures have taken place-



- 2010 – Lecture on ‘*Acharya Prafulla Chandra Roy*’ by Dr. Aparajit Basu
- 2011 – ‘*Water in Crisis*’ by Dr. Kalyan Rudra, scientist and water expert
- 2012 – Dr. Siddharta Majumder, Chairman of College Service Commission, West Bengal.
- 2013 – ‘*Parliamentary Democracy in India – the Challenges*’, by Prof. Bimal Shankar Nanda, Associate Professor, Political Science, Charu Chandra College, Kolkata
- 2014 – ‘*The Cosmic World*’ by Dr. D.P Duari, Director of Birla Planetarium, Kolkata



Administrative Innovations

Administration is an integral part of the college. Without proper administration academics cannot flourish. Administrative innovations can be categorized into – general administration and departmental administration.

Departmental Administration

- ❖ Every year ‘teachers – parents meet’ is held in December. Parents / Guardians are informed about the date well in advance. Generally this meet is arranged on a Saturday as most offices are closed on this day. This meet is very effective as parents / guardians get an opportunity to interact with the Principal of the college. Suggestions that come from parents / guardians are recorded and efforts are made to implement them, if possible. Teachers of each department inform parents / guardians about their ward’s performance as well as attendance.

- ❖ The college is very serious about attendance of the students. The departments publish attendance chart on a regular basis. Calcutta University requires a student to have 75% attendance to appear in CU exam. However if a student has 60% attendance s/he can appear for CU exam after paying a fine. Departments try to ensure that a student has the required attendance.
- ❖ If a student continues to remain absent for a period of time without informing the college then a letter is sent to that student asking him / her to contact respective departmental in – charge within a certain time frame. If there is no response from that student then a letter is issued in that student’s name informing him / her that his / her name has been struck off from the college register.
- ❖ Principal holds meetings with departments from time to time. In such meetings teachers inform him about their difficulties, if any, and Principal also gets an idea of how the department is functioning. He makes a note and it is forwarded to the Academic Council of the college for further deliberation.
- ❖ Principal also makes surprise visits to the different departments of the college. He interacts with the students and gets feedback from them about the department. Problems faced by the students are taken up during departmental meetings.
- ❖ Principal has asked the departmental teachers to make sure that the students wear their college identity cards round their necks when they are within college premises. This is done to arrest the entry of outsiders posing as students of the college.

General Administration

Just as the departments of the college function within a framework of rules to ensure maximum output in the same way measures are taken to see that the general administration of the runs smoothly.

- ❖ The college makes an effort to **generate revenue** by offering the college building as centers of different examinations. These exams, mostly related to jobs, are generally held on Sundays. The working of the college is not hampered.
- ❖ The salary of the staff of the college gets transferred to their respective account.
- ❖ In the best interest of its staff every year an **outing is arranged**. All the teaching and non teaching staff participates in this annual gathering. On that day the staff of the college forgets all tensions and is totally engrossed in fun and laughter. This gathering acts as a catalyst and gives us all renewed energy. It also serves as a means of bonding all the members of the college.
- ❖ A security guard is specially appointed for the purpose of **college safety**. He is posted at the main entry of the college and any outsider entering the college has to sign in. at present the guard at the college gate has been recruited from Zebra Security.
- ❖ As security is our prime concern **CCTVs** have been installed at strategic locations. The college has its own **fire safety device** and **water purifiers** have been installed at various locations to guarantee safe drinking water,
- ❖ Clean environment ensures healthy environment. Some students of this college have the bad habit of chewing guthkha and pan masala and spitting on the walls of the college. If any student is found doing this then s/he is fined. This has been effective as the rate of committing this nuisance has decreased.

- ❖ The Secretary of Teachers' Council, 2014-15, introduced certain innovations like –
 - i) Presented a Calendar containing pictures of different college activities on New Year to the members of the Council.
 - ii) Letter box and E mail has been created which is placed in the Staff room

7.3 Best Practices: (I)

Title of the Practice: Annual Awards

Goal

Our motto of self reliance is a constant reminder of the commitment we have made to the society. In keeping with this broad vision we the teachers and non teaching members of the college sincerely want our students to utilize their three years of undergraduate learning in developing themselves. When a student performs to his satisfaction in an exam it gives him / her not only the motivation to sustain this performance but others also want to emulate that person. If, along with this there is some external motivation from the institution then the desire to achieve gets piqued. The system of award initiated in 2012 has been done with the core idea to motivate the students to make themselves better.

The Context:

The matter was taken up by the Governing Body of the college. In a meeting of the Governing Body it was decided that award prizes to students of the college will be awarded on the basis of performance in Calcutta University exams as also on the basis of extra curricular activities if one wins laurels in university / Inter – college State level competitions.

When it was decided that the college will felicitate students who have earned laurels at CU exam the decision encountered two challenges. First was what was to be the benchmark of such awards. Our students come from very humble backgrounds and there are some students who are still first generation learners. When Principal Khudiram Bose started this college in 1894 he wanted to serve the under privileged section of the society and dedicated his life in doing so. Though we have come a long way from that still some of our students just have the bare minimum marks criteria required for higher education. Our objective was to raise the standard of these students and to make them perform better. It was thought that if the award standard was set at a very low level then also students would not feel motivated enough to achieve success. Therefore such a standard had to be determined that would not frighten the students and at the same time would not seem an impossible target. The college Governing Body tried to come to a solution.

The second challenge encountered was fund. The college Governing Body opined that for such a noble cause money would never be a barrier and asked Principal of the college to proceed with this plan. It was decided that a separate account, 'endowment fund' would be maintained for this purpose. A proposal was drawn up in this regard. The President of the Governing Body declared that he would donate a prize in memory of his mother.

The Governing Body of the college unanimously agreed that every year 15th December would be earmarked as Annual Prize Distribution Day. On that day Khudiram Bose Memorial Lecture is held in the college to commemorate the death anniversary of our founding father Principal Khudiram Bose.

The Practice and its Implementation:

As the general consensus was in favour of setting up a system of award for the benefit of the students the President of the Governing Body took upon himself the task of framing a structure within which this system was to operate. Certain rules and regulations were drawn up in a meeting held on 21.11.2012.

- Prizes will be awarded on the basis of results of Part III, Part II and Part I exam to Honours students securing highest marks in all the above examinations, provided the candidate has scored a minimum of 50% marks and cleared all the subjects.
- Similarly in the General category prizes will be awarded to candidates securing highest marks in Part III, Part II and Part I. The marks in the general category in Arts and Science will be calculated by adding the marks obtained by the candidate in three general subjects. In case of Commerce the marks obtained in all general subjects will be calculated. However candidate (s) will be eligible for such an award provided he / she has scored a minimum of 50%.
- Any candidate securing First Class in Honours will be awarded Gold medal. Any candidate securing with First Division will be awarded a special prize.
- The President of the Governing Body declared that the prize to which he is committed will be awarded to the “girl student securing highest marks” in Honours, among all subjects.
- The College Topper among honours students will be awarded Khudiram Bose Memorial Prize (Gold Medal).

FUNDING OF THE PRIZES

As per decision of the Governing Body an “endowment fund” will be launched by the College with Rs. 50,000.00 donated by the College as corpus fund.

An appeal will be made to the teachers, non – teacher staff, both past and present, and to the society at large for generous donation to this fund. Prizes will be awarded out of the interest earned on this fund.

There has been an amendment as far as marks criteria of prizes are concerned. This change was thought of with the purpose to elevate the standard of the college. From 2014 the change prizes will be distributed following these changes.

- Prizes will be given to First Year Honours students securing at least 60% marks in honours subject.
- Prizes will be given to Second Year Honours students securing at least 60% marks in honours subjects.
- Marks criterion for Third Year (Part III) honours students remain unchanged that are students will have to secure at least 55% marks in honours subjects.
- First year, Second Year and Third Year general category students will have to secure at least 55% marks to get prizes.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Calcutta University generally conducts Part III exam in April – May, Part II from end of May to June, Part I from end of July. The results get published either just before puja vacation or immediately after college opens after puja vacation. The general results get published at a much later date. For this reason it gets difficult to host the Prize distribution ceremony on 15th December. Coupled with late result publication is the fact that whenever there is an election Calcutta University exam gets impacted. The college has to award current year's prizes the next year and so on. Apart from this there is not really any significant problem the college encountered in awarding prizes to the students.

TITLE: Sports

GOAL:

“Mens sana in Corpore Sano” - healthy mind in a healthy body.

Principal Khudiram Bose founded this college with the commitment of attaining a self reliant society. In order to do this he wanted to make our nation builders self reliant. The journey from the micro level to the macro can never be complete without sports. Physical strength compliments mental strength. To ameliorate the vision of our founder the college decided to make sports an integral part of the college curriculum.

“Sports serve society by providing vivid examples of excellence” said George F Will. In tune with this saying one of the primary objectives of the college is to see that more students participate in sports. Effective team work coupled with leadership ability helps in the long run. Not only these sports develops in a person discipline, punctuality and sense of responsibility. College was inspired by Vivekananda’s saying This surged us to inculcate sports into our college curriculum.

The Context:

The college got affiliation from Calcutta University to introduce Physical Education as a general stream subject from the session 2010-11. As the college does not have a full time teacher in physical education one teacher was appointed for this purpose in 2009. At present he enjoys the status of Government appointed Part Time Teacher. There is also one guest teacher to facilitate the department. It is only after the appointment of a teacher in the physical education department that the College started contemplating sports as part of college curriculum.

To make this effective certain relaxations are made during the time of admission. If any candidate has played at district level and has potential as a sportsperson s/he can apply for relaxation of marks criteria during the time of admission. If the admission committee thinks that such an application has merit then that particular student gets admission if s/he has minimum marks criteria specified by Calcutta University.

Sports pertain to the whole college and is not limited to the department of physical education. Therefore two teachers of the department find it difficult to manage the total sports of the college. To facilitate the work of these two teachers the college formed a Sports Committee. The Sports Secretary of the Students’ Union also puts in a lot of effort to develop this culture of sports in college. The college does not have its own ground. Neither can we offer the facility of a gymnasium. Students have to be mentored elsewhere before any event. This was and continues to be a serious problem for us.

The Practice and its Implementation

The college aims at helping students interested in sports become graduates. For this reason relaxation of norms is made for promising sports people. These students also enjoy relaxation in attendance. While it is mandatory that college students maintain 75% attendance, as per Calcutta University rules, students actively involved in sports are exempted from this rule.

Though the college lacks its own playground for the purpose of practice two grounds are available near the college locality. The physical instructor takes the students to either of these two grounds. The college authority ensures that students do not suffer from lack of any sports equipment. We have received financial help from UGC to buy sports equipment. The college also buys equipment from its own fund.

Students actively participate in different Calcutta University sports events. The level of participation is higher in cricket, athletics. However this year few students have taken part in gymnastics, badminton. Not only CU sports students also take part in Government sports events, sports organized by Kolkata Police.

Apart from these college also conducts certain in house events like football, cricket. Annual Sports Day is really a big event where not only students but also teachers and non teaching staff of the college take part. Prizes are given to all winners.

Some of our students also take part in national events. They win laurels and make the college proud.

In spite of all our constraints in providing infrastructural facilities to the students as far as sports is concerned for the last few years students have won accolades at different areas.

The college ensures that the common room of the students has indoor games facilities like table tennis board, carom board and chess board. From this academic session the Sports Committee of the college has prepared a 'sports calendar' to be followed by the college in organizing sports events. After classes begin names are invited from the students willing to participate in different sports events. This is done in a form of notice and is circulated among the students for at least seven days. A copy of the same is given to the Sports Secretary of Students' Union. The college organizes an inauguration ceremony at the beginning of each academic session. The Principal in his welcome speech to the students informs them about the sports facility in the college.

The Games Secretary of the college is a member of Sports Committee and actively helps in this sphere.

In spite of best efforts made by college to promote the culture of sports, not more than 30% of student population engage themselves in sports activities. The Sports Committee faces this huge challenge to include more of our students in this sphere.

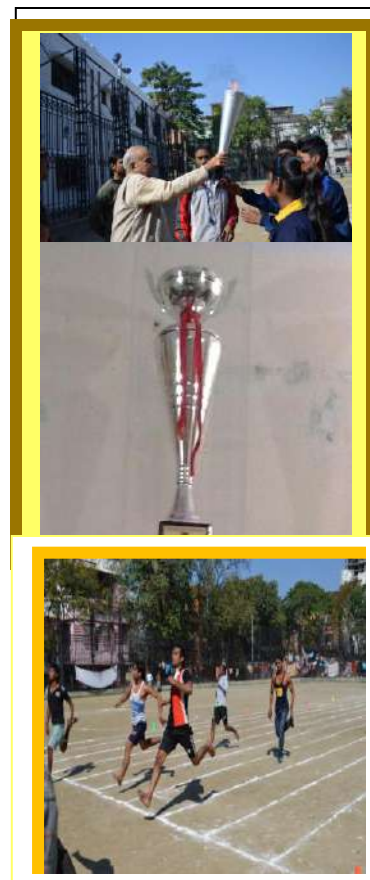
Evidence of Success:

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The department of Physical education started functioning from the academic session 2009 – 2010. The college started show casing sports an integral part of college education only from 2013 onwards. The basic problems faced were

- ❖ Lack of play ground
- ❖ Shortage of space inside college premises
- ❖ Lack of sports literacy among the students
- ❖ Financial constraints

The college is fully aware that without its own ground students cannot practice. But at present there is no provision for the college to secure its own play ground. In such a scenario the best that the college could do is to ensure that grounds available near the college can be used by the students. The college takes permission to use the grounds from the local Councilor.

Equipment facilities are available to the students.

To promote sports literacy among the students of the college arranged a lecture session by, Dr. Sudharshan Bhowmick, Sports Officer of Calcutta University. He gave the students a holistic idea of the benefits of sports. Students who do well in sports are eligible to get job in offices of state and central governments. He also talked about the benefits of sports in shaping an individual's personality.

The college got financial help from UGC for the purchase of equipment. Whenever there is any immediate need of any equipment the college provides from its own coffer. Students participating in cricket and football events get jersey.

If the college has already undergone the accreditation process by NAAC, please highlight the significant quality sustenance and enhancement measures undertaken during the last four years.

The college has undergone NAAC Peer Team visit in March 2007. The Peer team members after their visit were optimistic about the future of the college. They gave their suggestion which has been included in the 'executive summary of the college'. Implementations as per their suggestions have also been incorporated in the executive summary.

This part deals with the initiatives taken by the college post NAAC accreditation. The motto of the college is 'self reliance' and to achieve this vision the college has to ensure that positive steps are taken in this regard. The Governing Body of the college is our lodestar never allowing us to digress from the path of our commitment.

Our post NAAC accreditation initiatives are mentioned follows –

◆ *Space Creation*

One of the major constraints of this college is space. Some of the bigger class rooms have been partitioned to create more class rooms. The college has been able to obtain the annex building where four new class rooms have been made. Apart from these classrooms there are also one project room, two store rooms, one room allotted to Physical Education, one staff attendant room and one washroom.

The college is now in the process of vertical expansion. In order to create some more space an extra floor is now under construction. The plan of that construction has been provided in Criterion IV. According to this plan the new space will house one auditorium, approximately four classrooms and washroom for men and women.

◆ *Acquiring the college building*

The college was run by Khudiram Bose Education Trust. The Trust has informed the Government its willingness to hand over the property to the college for the purpose of education. This matter is still under consideration of Government of West Bengal. The college is pursuing the matter and is eagerly awaiting government's approval.

◆ *Creation of new teaching and non teaching posts*

The college has now grown in student strength and the requirement of appointing more teachers for the different departments has been identified by the college authority. To meet this demand the college has sent a proposal to the Education Directorate vide Ref. No. KBC / 5/ 13 dated 08.01.13 for creation of new teaching posts in the following subjects as per Government specification. The college has asked for new teaching posts in the following subjects

- ➡ Bengali
- ➡ Hindi

- English
- Education
- History
- Political Science
- Journalism and Mass Communication
- Geography
- Economics
- Mathematics
- Physical Education
- Environment
- Commerce

In 2010 six new teachers were appointed as per recommendation of West Bengal College Service Commission. These teachers are

- Prof. Tapasi Ghosh, Department of Journalism and Mass Communication
- Prof. Sheuli Biswas (Adhikary), Department of Education
- Prof. Shilpa Nandy, Department of Political Science
- Prof. Raja Ghosh, Department of Geography
- Dr. Subrata Kumar Mallik, Department of Bengali
- Prof. Anamika Nandy, Department of History

The college has not only sent proposal for creation of new teaching posts the same has been done for non – teaching posts and has received six posts to be filled up by the college as per West Bengal appointment norms. These new posts were sanctioned in two phases. In the first phase the college got the posts of include

- One guard
- One lady attendant

In the second phase the college got the posts of

- Two clerks
- Two laboratory attendants, one for Geography lab and another for Journalism and Mass Communication lab.

◆ *Academic expansion*

We would like to go in for academic expansion as well. The college introduced new subjects after NAAC in 2007. Physical Education as a subject in the general stream is being offered from the academic session 2009-10. The college has been able to offer honours in Journalism and Mass Communication and Geography from academic session 2009-10 and 2010-11 respectively.

In the next academic session there are plans to introduce subjects like sociology, psychology, computer science in the general stream as these subjects are in demand. Our acute shortage of space dwarfs our efforts to introduce new subjects. However we are hopeful that with creation of new space we will be able to offer these subjects from the next academic session.

The college has postgraduate courses under the Directorate of Distance Education, Vidyasagar University and offers programmes in M.A., M.Com and M.Sc. The subjects offered are Bengali, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Geography and Commerce. The college plans to start its own postgraduate programme. In this respect the departments of Geography and Journalism are the trend setters. These two departments have already initiated the process and the matter is to be approved by the Governing Body of the college.

◆ *Defining new teaching learning strategies*

The teachers of this college always prioritized teaching learning above everything else. The continuous effort to implement new strategies for effective teaching learning has led to a host of innovations in this field. These are enumerated as follows-

▶ **Using technology aided learning parallel with the traditional chalk and board lecturing system.** Teachers use their laptops to design class room teaching. Instead of just holding discussion on some particular topic teachers use visuals to supplement lectures. As an example to clear this point we can say that while discussing European Renaissance the History teacher shows some visuals of Renaissance art. This arrests the interest of the students and piques their level of curiosity to know more.

▶ Departments arrange **departmental seminars** where students present papers on some particular topic. This type of activity helps the students to learn how to do research work. Many departments have project work as part of their syllabus but departmental seminars enrich the learning process of the students. History, English, Political Science departments use this effective strategy to motivate their students into understanding the importance of research work.

▶ Another initiative to enhance teaching learning effectiveness is arranging **inter departmental classes**. Knowledge is one entity. No subject can be called water tight compartment and there is always spilling over of information contained in one subject to another subject. Seminal ideas of one discipline can influence the growth of other departments. The teachers of one department include the teachers of another department to give a talk on a particular topic that is more pertinent to his / her area of study. The English department includes teachers from History, Political Science, Bengali and Hindi to take classes. The teacher of Journalism and Mass Communication is asked to take a class on 'report writing / review' with the students of Communicative English. Students enjoy this diversification.

▶ Visuals have always been an effective teaching tool. In this age of rampant technological progression we teachers feel students need to be fed with visuals. The text is not just enough and whenever and wherever possible they should be introduced to visual screening of the texts. In this area the English department very consciously arranges two days of 'film show' for the students of the department. These films are primarily **cinematic renditions of their texts and some films go beyond the syllabus**. Generally this show is arranged in the month of December prior to winter recess. Not only the English department but Political Science and History departments have also used this method of teaching. Journalism and Mass Communication department arranges screening of reputed movies followed by review of the film.

- ▶ The department of Hindi introduced a new concept in teaching learning process – **dramatization of part of their text**. The students enjoy enacting their text and it also propelled fuel for thought for other departments.
- ▶ **Field trip** is mandatory for the Geography department. The teachers of the humanities subjects felt the need to arrange such trips for the students of their departments. Different departments arrange ‘education tours’ for the students of their departments. At times these tours are in collaboration with other departments or individual departments also make such arrangements. The departments of Hindi, Political Science, Education and Journalism took the students to Vidhan Sabha. The History department organized education tour to Indian Museum; the English department visited Birla Museum of Technology. These ‘one day education tours’ provide the students a totally different ambience to learn something beyond the scope of their syllabus.
- ▶ **Extension lectures** also fit into the curriculum framed by the teachers of the departments. Political Science, English and Commerce departments have arranged such lectures. Workshops have been organized by Journalism and Mass Communication department where resource persons had come from reputed newspapers.

◆ *Academic transparency*

Academic transparency is maintained by the departments at two levels –

- ▶ **Preparation of academic calendar** - The students are given academic calendars within the first few days of their academic session. This calendar contains the details of the syllabus, the time frame required to complete different modules or topics, names of teachers to deal with particular modules or topics and if possible probable dates of unit tests.
- ▶ **Maintaining academic record book.** – Each department has its own record book. This book allows the teachers of the department to get an idea what part of the syllabus is being covered by a particular teacher at a particular point of time.
- ▶ For the past five years the college organizes **Parents – teachers’ Meet**. The teachers meet the parents / guardians and give them a detailed progress report of their child’s performance both in academics and attendance. Papers of unit tests are also kept ready for the guardians to see and understand the progress of the candidate.

◆ *Committees and Cells*

After our NAAC visit in March 2007 the college formed different committees and cells to cater to the diverse needs of the students. Some of these committees and cells have been framed following the requirement of UGC schemes and other were result of the changing thought processes and look forward attitude of the teachers.

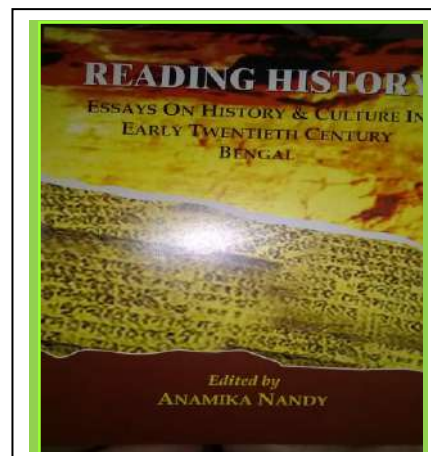
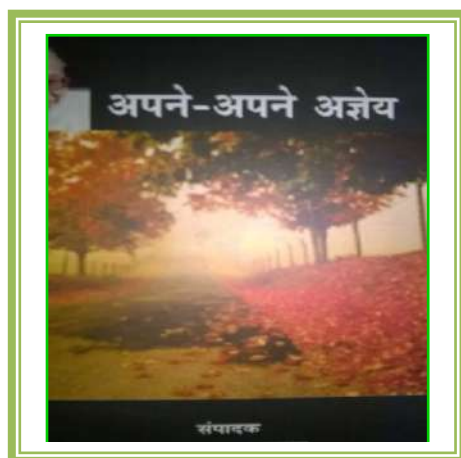
◆ **Publications**

◆ **Research --- Minor Reasrach Project Report**

Not only are students motivated to do research work teachers are equally encouraged to pursue research work. In 2014 Prof. Shilpa Nandy, department of Political Science submitted her Minor Research Project, funded by UGC, titled '*Socio Economic and Political status of Fisherwomen Community: A Study of Purba Midnapore and South 24 Parganas Districts in West Bengal.*' She has also applied for a Major Research Project to ICSSR, New Delhi which has been under consideration. Two other teachers, Prof Sheuli Biswas (Adhikary), Department of Education and Prof Raja Ghosh, Department of Geography have submitted their Minor Research Project proposals and are awaiting sanction from UGC.

◆ Sports

‘Sports foster many things that are good; teamwork and leadership’. This saying by Daley Thompson can be summed up as our motivation to inculcate sports within our college curriculum. The values of team spirit and leadership are instrumental in structuring the mental orientation of a student and the college takes initiatives in channelizing the students in this direction. Students take part in many sports activities conducted by University, Government and other organizations.

◆ Important Events

Since NAAC visit in 2007 the college has included some dates to be observed within the college premises. These are –

- **12th January** – Swami Vivekananda’s birthday is observed as National Youth day. On this day the students, teachers and non teaching staff of the college visit the ancestral house of the Swami and the rest of the day is spent in watching the cultural programme prepared by the students of our college. The students are once again reminded of their responsibility towards nation building. The NCC and NSS wings of the college play an active role in making this day a success.
- **21st February** – the Bengali department of the college salutes those brave souls who braved bullets and died as martyrs on 21st February 1952 to retain the identity of Bengali language in the soil of Bangladesh (then East Pakistan). Their action led to the recognition of this language as the official language of Bangladesh.
- **9th May** – popularly known to the nation as ‘*Pachishe Baisakh*’ the birth anniversary of the poet Rabindranath Tagore is celebrated with fanfare by the Bengali department. Also the department pays tribute by observing ‘**Baishe Shrabon**’, the death anniversary of the poet.
- **31st July** – the Hindi department of the college arrange ‘*Munshi Premchand Memorial Lecture*’. An eminent person is invited to give a talk on any aspect of Munshi Premchand’s writings. This occasion flagged off from 2010 and so far the following distinguished persons have honoured the college by giving a talk on Munshi Premchand –

- **14th September** – on this day the department of Hindi observes Hindi Divas to honour our national language and also propagates the cultural heritage and values of this language. The whole college joins this department in acknowledging the richness associated with our ‘*rashtriya bhasa*’.

- **15th December** - Khudiram Bose Memorial Lecture is arranged by the college on this day. It was decided in a meeting of the Governing Body that such a lecture will be organized by the college on this day to pay our sincere respect to our founder Principal Khudiram Bose. 15th December is his death anniversary. This occasion commenced from 2010 and till date the following lectures have been arranged by the college.

2010 – Lecture on ‘*Acharya Prafulla Chandra Roy*’ by Dr. Aparajit Basu

- 2011 – ‘*Water in Crisis*’ by Dr. Kalyan Rudra, scientist and water expert
- 2012 – Dr. Siddharta Majumder
- 2013 – ‘*Parliamentary Democracy in India – the Challenges*’, by Prof. Bimal Shankar Nanda, Associate Professor, Political Science, Charu Chandra College, Kolkata
- 2014 – ‘*The Cosmic World*’ by Dr. D.P Duari, Director of Birla Planetarium, Kolkata
- 2015 – ‘*Bagha Jatin and Buribalamer Juddha*’ to be delivered by Dr. Pabitra Gupta.

◆ Awards

They say faith can move mountains. It is with this sincere belief that the college ventured into this award and prizes ceremony for the students who win laurels at the Calcutta University exam. What is unique about our system is that we just don't recognize laurel winners of final year but we also acknowledge the efforts made by our students at the Part I and Part II levels. Prizes are distributed in two categories – general and special. The general prizes are funded from the college's own coffer and the special prizes are given by individuals in memory of their loved ones. This system of awards has bred an environment of healthy competition among the students of the departments. We are very optimistic that the college result will definitely improve with the passage of time and this concept of awarding the laurel winners will serve as a catalyst.

■ Alumni Formation:

It was 9th April 2012, the college first took the initiative and formed an internal alumni association named ---‘*Punarnava*’ under the supervision of a committee and organized its first re-union programme under the co-ordinatorship of Prof. Shilpa Nandy, Assistant Prof. in Political Science. In this programme, all our ex- principals, teachers, staffs and students of the college were invited. Our college first *Newsletter* --- ‘*KBCC Newsletter*’ was also published and the programme was also attended by *Hon'ble Consumer Affairs Minister, Govt. of West Bengal, Sri Sadhan Pandey and other distinguished delegates of the state. Moreover, the Alumni Committee of the college decided to get this body registered under Societies Registration Act, 1961. With this aim, the college has already completed its registration process and is soon expecting to get its registration number.*

◆ *Technological advancement*

In the first cycle of NAAC visit in 2007 one of their suggestions was computerization of office and library. The college paid heed to this suggestion and post 2007 has seriously contemplated the transition from pen and paper record keeping to the use of computers as a substitute. The first change initiated in this regard was changing the system of admission from manual system to computerization. Next step to follow was changing the system of maintaining accounts. Special software was designed to help the office in this regard. Now all major office work is done with the help of computers. From 2015 the admission process was also conducted online. Though a lot of effort has been initiated by college authority in computerization of work still there are sections where the office is yet to upgrade itself. The record of student performance in Calcutta University exam is still maintained using the pen and paper method.

The college library is in process of digitization. Information pertaining to books is being fed into the system so that students can get information on availability of books through computer. This process is soon to get completed.

The teaching faculty is dependent on technology for preparing their class lectures. The teachers use materials from internet and provide the students with the same. Departments also show films, documentaries with the help of laptops. Power point presentation is shown with the help of LCD projector.

The change from the traditional system to the new age of technology has already been initiated. The college is gradually picking up the pace and very shortly will develop itself. The future plan of the college includes more dependency on technology thereby launching into a new genre of teaching learning.

◆ *Internal Quality Assurance Cell*

Post NAAC initiative requires setting up of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The basic objective behind this is to continue the flow of development in the college that started with NAAC visit. This college also formed its IQAC after NAAC visit in 2007. The internal members were

Sadhan Saha who is yet to be intimated about his membership in IQAC. Once our Alumni body gets registered under Societies Registration Act 1961 the IQAC will have members from this sector as well.

Since its formation this Cell has tried to ensure that the influx of growth, which started with NAAC visit in 2007, is maintained. The Cell has become more vigilant since its second formation in 2013. Some of the key areas where the Cell has focused are

- ◆ Infrastructure enhancement

- ◆ SWOC analysis of college by students
- ◆ CAS of teachers

It will be incorrect to state that the Cell has been successful in all its endeavours. But the Cell has not stopped its untiring effort in propagating quality enhancement within the college.

There are many more fundamental issues that the Cell needs to address like creating an atmosphere of research. With time to come the Cell will be true to all its commitment.


