1	CourseTitle	<b>PUBLIC POLICY IN INDIA: NATURE AND DIMENSIONS</b>
2	Context	This course aims to provide the students with an insight into the different aspects of public policy in India. The knowledge acquired by them would be utilized towards practical ends. It would enable them to pursue higher studies on diverse aspects of public policy, its study, research, and practice, which has now become one of the important areas of study in the discipline of social science. It would help the students to apply the understanding of policy-making, its implementation, its application, and the ramifications that it generates in the wider societal context.

4	Course Objective	<p>The basic objective of this course is to facilitate students to participate enthusiastically in all aspects of policy making, its theories, laws, provisions, implementation, feedback process, and its vitality in pursuing good governance practices in India. It will help them understand the policy-making approach from an interdisciplinary perspective and comprehend/analyze the different areas, issues, and problems related to the political, socio-economic, environmental and developmental levels in a country.</p> <p>The course provides opportunities to the learners for higher studies in the area of theoretical and applied public policy-making courses and even gives them an upper hand in preparing the said topic for various competitive examinations including NET/SET, UPSC, and other related exams.</p>
5	Programme Highlight and Unique Features	<p>The policy-making process in India consists of six steps: agenda setting, policy formulation, adoption, implementation, evaluation, and policy maintenance. The syllabus will cover all these areas along with several related topics including problem identification in society to the need for policy making for the evolving needs of the people.</p> <p>An interesting and well-planned mix of lectures, and activities will contribute towards the overall personality development of students by helping them to discover their latent talents and instilling in them leadership qualities.</p>
